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Knight, William W., Letter to Mary Knight, July 30, 1862

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Caustons Bluff Chily 30 to 1868 Dear Wife I Received yours of the 16 TO X 24Th Several days ago but I have waited titl now to answer yours knowing you would get a letter mailed the last of the week as soon as if Sent it of soones This leave me in tolerable good health and I hope it will find you and the children in good health and doing well we have a little news in our camp as it happened near enough for us to hear the guis probably a part of it is true five Federal Suboals attacke but they with after yesterday morning and the Battery proving to throng for them this place nine miles below the Ogechee Bridge the Hashville lies there taking on a cargo of cotton and no doubt they have got information of her where about for the Savannah news papers has been very indiscreet in regard to the Sashville & Rate it very certain that they get the Savannah paper regular and will eacontinue to do so unless there is a thousand or two yankers killer out of that place the hate has been gone some ten days we think the got off safe but it will be very difficult for the Nashville to run the brockade how although they cannot take her where she is they may cause our people to have to burn her to keep her out of their hands

but I hope she will be able to get off sake yet wary you mote to me to get off from the service and come home if I was to leave the service there would be no chance to get off in my case I know of. four men in our camp but not in our company that is at times imable to stand on there feet from the Same cause yet they cannot get clear on that account if they were not in the Dervice they would not be received but there is no chance for them, be discharged I believed it is my deity to do all I can for our country and as long as aim able I will try to do my duty as Toldeer I no the need of my presence at home and all I hold dear on earth there Dave my rights as feeman und the rights of those dear to me count be defended there same interior the for or our proportion will soon be gone too many have already gone out of the army for our good and still more are bying to get of on every hince frivelous excuse my family and home is dear to me as any mans, and God knows I would be glad to be with Them I do not like the idea of war but Stern necessity forces is to it with all our strength we should must it with all its calamities not trying to see how many may evade it but all should do there whole duty and with God giving me strength I hope to do mine I do not think we have justice done us by some. of our head men but we should not give up our country o cause on that account but all such shows be but down if we cannot do it now there will come a time when it will be done we have not had justice

Caustoun's Bluff July 30th 1862

Dear wife,

I received yours of the 16th and 24th several days ago but I have waited till now to answer you, knowing you would get a letter mailed the last day of the week as if I sent it or sooner. This leave[sic] in tolerable good health and I hope it will find you and the children in good health and doing well. We have a little news in our camp as it happened near enough for us to hear the guns. Probably a part of it is is true. Five Federal gunboats attacked Genisis Point Battery yesterday morning and but they withdrew after a [short?] engagement. The battery proving to strong for them. This place nine miles below the Ogechee Bridge, the Nashville lies there taking in a cargo of cotton and no doubt they have got information of her whereabouts for the Savannah newspapers has been very indiscreet in regard to the Nashville. And Kate, its very certain that they get the Savannah papers regular and will continue to do so unless there is a thousand or two yankees killed out of that place. The Kate has been gone some ten days, we think she got off safe, but it will be very difficult for the Nashville to run the blockade. Now although they cannot take her where is, they may cause out people to have to burn her to keep her out of their hands, but I hope she will be able to get off safe yet. Mary, you wrote to me to get off from the service and come home. If I was to leave the service there would be no chance to get off in my case. I know of four men in our camp but not in our company that is at times unable to stand on there feet from the same cause, yet they cannot get clear on that account if they were not in the service, they would not be received, but there is no chance for them to be discharged. I believed it is my duty to do all I can for our country, and as long as I am able, I will try to do my duty as [a] soldier. I no[sic] the need of my presence at home and all I hold dear on earth there, save my rights as free man and the rights of those dear to me cannot be defended there save [damaged passage] will soon be gone. Too many have already gone out of this army for our good and still more are trying to get off on every kind [of] frivolous excuse. My family and home is dear to me as any man's and God knows I would be glad to be with them. I do not like the idea of war, but stern necessity forces us to it with all our strength. We should meet it with all its calamities, not trying to see how many may evade it, but all should do there[sic] whole duty, and with God giving me Strength, I hope to do mine. I do not think we have justice done us by some of our head me, but we should not give up our country cause on that account, but all such should be put down if we cannot do it now, there will come a time when it will be done. We have not had justice.
