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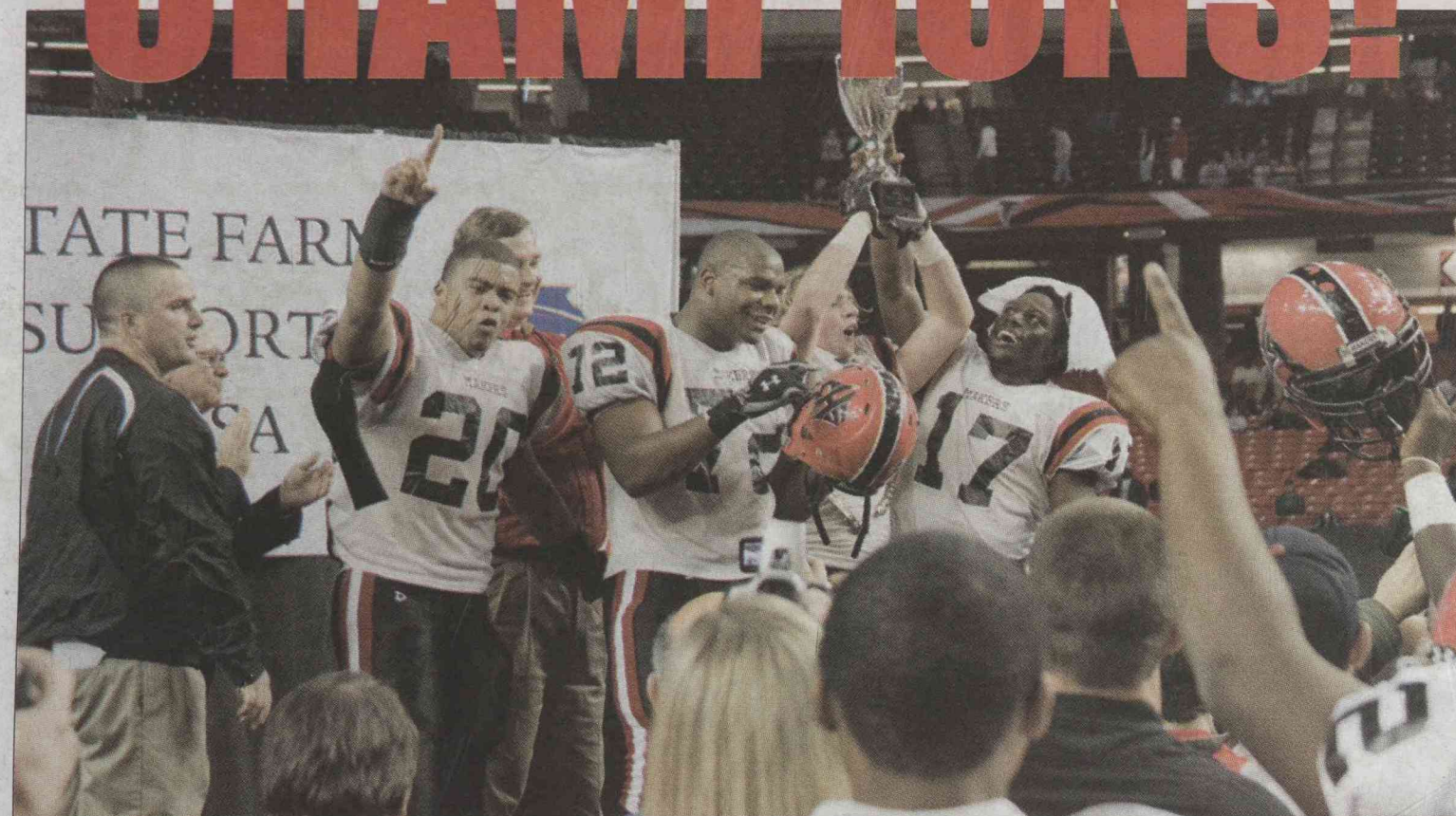

Makers claim AAA state title

The Cairo Syrupmakers claimed the 2008 AAA state championship with a 28-14 win over Flowery Branch last Saturday in the Georgia Dome. This marks only the third state championship in school history, with the other two coming in 1946 and 1990. The Syrupmakers finished the season 14-0, becoming only the second team in school history to finish with a perfect record. This was also the first AAA championship game held in the Georgia Dome.

The Flowery Branch Falcons, playing in their first ever state championship game, took an early 3-0 lead on a 14-play, 79-yard drive to start the game. The Syrupmaker defense stiffened at the five-yard line and forced the Falcons to kick a 21-yard field goal with 5:02 to go in the first quarter.

The Falcon defense then held the Makers scoreless and drove the ball again, this time to the Syrupmaker 28-yard line. The Maker defense again held, forcing the Falcons to kick another field goal, this time from 44 yards out to take a 6-0 lead with 9:34 to play in the first half.

"I thought Flowery Branch did a good job of executing their offense," Cairo coach Tom Fallaw said. "They came out and moved the ball and didn't make any mistakes. There were times that our defense bent a little bit, but it didn't break."

The Syrupmakers, trailing 0-6, needed a break and got it after the Makers were stopped again by the Falcon defense. Senior cornerback Johnathan Shine intercepted

Falcon quarterback Conner Shaw's pass at the Cairo three-yard line, which ignited the thousands of Syrupmaker fans in the Dome, and also gave the Maker offense a jump start.

"That interception and the subsequent drive really turned the momentum, I believe," Fallaw said. The Makers, who had managed just 12 total yards of offense up to that point, then drove the ball 97 yards for a touchdown that culminated when senior quarterback Angelo Pease found Dewayne Isom open for a 19-yard pass for a touchdown with 44 seconds left in the half.

The drive featured big plays by Pease, who managed to bob and weave his way through rushing Falcon defenders and keep the drive alive, completing five of seven passes in the final 60 yards. The Syrupmaker offensive line was winning the battle down front, protecting Pease long enough to find open receivers and providing openings for Bryant and Ronnie Wooten along the way, as well.

The Syrupmakers, leading 7-6, started the second half on a big note when Bryant raced 43 yards on the first play from scrimmage. However, it was Cairo's next possession when Pease found a seam in the line of scrimmage and sprinted 78 yards to give Cairo a 14-6 lead after Logan Gainous' second extra point of the night with 6:31 to play in the quarter.

However, the Falcons would answer right back on a 72-yard bomb from Shaw to Chris Lipscomb. The two-point conversion tied the game at 14 with 6:19 to play in the third quarter.

The Syrupmakers then responded with a 17-yard

touchdown pass to J.J. Wilcox from Pease. The drive featured a big fourth-and-three-yard try in which Wooten converted with less than a few inches to spare.

Cairo's defense tightened, allowing the Falcons no more positive yards the rest of the game. With a seven-point lead, Cairo went to the power game with Bryant and Pease on the ground. The Makers scored their final touchdown of the game on a three-yard touchdown by Bryant, and Gainous' fourth extra point of the night gave the Makers a 28-14 lead.

Cairo ended the Falcons' last scoring opportunity when Pease, playing in the defensive secondary, went up between two Falcon receivers and intercepted the final pass of the game. With Flowery Branch out of timeouts, the Syrupmakers took three snaps and ran the clock out to claim the championship.

Pease finished with 15 carries for 105 yards, a rushing touchdown, and a touchdown pass to Isom. Bryant had a touchdown and 137 yards on 19 carries. Cairo finished with 352 yards of offense, while Flowery Branch had 193 yards total. Pease was 8 of 14 for 95 yards, and the Falcons' quarterback Conner Shaw was 9 of 14 for 125 yards and two interceptions. Daniel Drummond, the Falcons' running back, who has already committed to Georgia Tech, finished the game with 12 rushes and 42 yards. The Cairo defense held the Falcons to a negative one yard of offense after the 72-yard touchdown pass.

Cairo finished the season with a 14-0 record and the AAA state championship.

Fallow leads undefeated Syrupmaker team to state title

After the big win over Flowery Branch last Saturday in the Georgia Dome, Syrupmaker head coach Tom Fallaw sat quietly, alone in a small dressing room, obviously soaking everything in, relishing a championship effort and reflecting on a dream season. Exhausted, emotionally drained, and overcome by the realization that the season was over, and had ended in a perfect 14-0 championship.

"It's been great, we're all very happy," said Fallaw back home on Monday. "I think we put a lot of hard work into this.

It's always good when the hard work pays off. It certainly did this year, and it did last year, to a point, too." The 14-0 championship season comes on

the heels of a 13-2 season the year before that saw Fallaw's Syrupmakers vie for the first ever state championship played in West Thomas Stadium, losing in the final minute to Carver-Columbus 13-16.

With 28 seniors returning on a team that played for the state championship one year earlier, the pressure to win mounted each week. "I think the maturity of these seniors got us through. They had a goal and were focused on achieving that goal," said Fallaw.

The Syrupmakers had to overcome a lot early on in the season. Their opening game with Bainbridge was rescheduled, then canceled because of weather. The Makers had an open date, then played two games, then had another open date." From the season being delayed to as far as we made it all the way to the championship, I think our kids have been there and done it and just kind of knew what to expect," Fallaw said.

Fallow, who was hired in 2003, had never been a head football coach. CHS Athletic Director Carlton Gainous, who helped hire the new coach, said he and then CHS Principal Tim Helms saw something special in the coach. "We knew we were taking a chance, hiring a guy that had never been a head coach, but we were impressed with Tom's knowledge of the game, his work ethic and his ability to motivate kids," said Gainous.

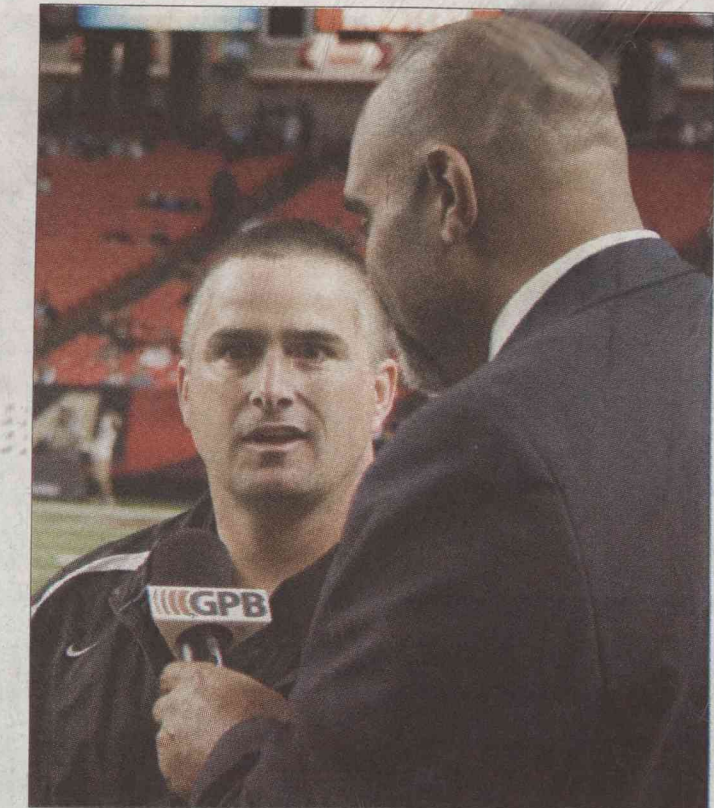
"He really cares about these kids, and he has surrounded himself with a staff that cares as much as he does. You can see it in how they react to him, relate with him and, most of all, how they play for him," said Gainous.

Since 2003, Fallaw has led his Syrupmakers to the state playoffs every year. Four of his six seasons, he has won 10 games or more. Overall he has compiled a 59-16 record and has only four losses since 2005. This year's 14-0 season is only the second perfect season in Syrupmaker history.

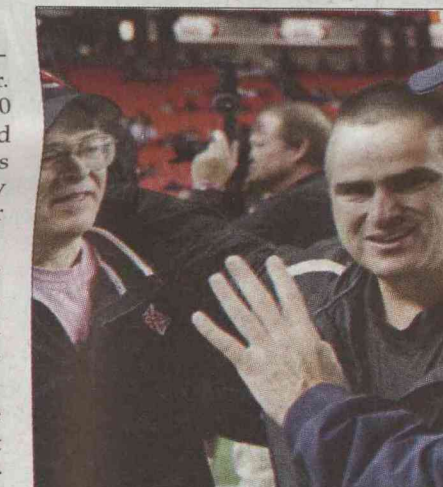
One who likes to stay out of the spotlight and is more comfortable seeing his players receive the focus, the Cairo coach will have to get used to the newfound attention.

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Syrupmaker offense exploded in '08

The 2008 Syrupmaker football team always found ways to score and score often. In all, Cairo racked up 451 points, that's an average of 32.2 points per game over the 14-game season.

Cairo scored in double figures all season long. As one opposing coach said after playing Cairo, "I've never seen so many offensive sets from one team in my life." Flowery Branch coach Lee Shaw said, "We knew they were going to score points, we just hoped to score one more."

The Maker offense really poured it on in the playoffs, scoring 40 or more points in three of the five playoff games, including a 48-point output against Troup County. Offensively, Cairo seemed to get better as the game went along. The Makers scored a total of 97 points in the first quarter, 127 in the second quarter, 108 in the third quarter and 130 points in the fourth quarter this season.

While the Makers enjoyed success through the air, their 'forte' was the run. The Syrupmaker offense averaged 250 yards a game on the ground, with a total of 3,497 yards rushing. Through the air, Cairo passed for 1,519 yards on the season, with Angelo Pease doing most of the passing and throwing only one interception all season.

In all, Cairo's total offensive output on the 2008 season was 5,016 total yards. Cairo's Reginald Bryant accounted for 1,692 yards rushing on the year to become Cairo's only career 5,000-yard rusher. His counterpart, Ronnie Wooten, rushed for 737 yards on the season.

Quarterback Angelo Pease rushed for 882 yards and passed for 1,493 yards on the season, that's 2,375 yards contributed to the offense by the Cairo signal caller. Dewayne Isom caught a majority of Pease's passes, accounting for 750 of Pease's total yards through the air. J.J. Wilcox finished with 307 yards in receiving, and Reginald Bryant had 198 yards of receiving yardage. Chris Adams finished with 108 yards of receiving on the

season.

As in 1990, this 2008 Syrupmaker team featured a small but tough offensive line. A group of seniors that never weighed more than their opponents, but always found a way to move the offense. Justin Palmer, Blake Young, Jesse Grant, Anthony Brown, Brian Gainor and Lester Harrell always provided a way, no matter how big, how strong or how fast their opponents were, they faced the challenge, and won the battles.

In 1990, the rushing tandem of James Gore, Herman Garland and Raymond Taylor led the way to the championship run and garnered the name "911" because when you called, they always got it done on the field. In 2008, Syrupmaker fans enjoyed watching Pease, Bryant, Wooten and Mike Johnson in the backfield. They picked up names like "Thunder and Lightning," and "The Perfect Storm." Whatever you called them, you can now call them "Champions," and they will be remembered for years to come.

Defense wins championships

There has long been a saying that defense wins championships. This year, along with a potent offense, the Syrupmaker defense help lead the Makers to a perfect 14-0 season.

The 2008 Cairo defense was led by a group of seniors who prided themselves in a swarming, gang-tackling attack. Eleven helmets around the ball at the end of the play was always the goal of the Maker defense.

This defensive group, mostly seniors, has played together over the last three years. This season, they gave up 26 points in the first quarter, 31 in the second, 14 in the third, and 46 in the fourth quarter all season. Many of the fourth quarter points came after the Syrupmakers began pulling starters when games were out of reach.

In all, the Cairo defense allowed just 111 total points. That's just 7.9 points a game. Cairo tallied three shutouts on the year, and allowed more than seven

points only four times all year.

Montavious "Mufasa" Williams led the defense in total production with 90 tackles, 20 for losses, 12.5 sacks, and 21 quarterback pressures. Jake Elkins, a middle linebacker and three-year starter for the Makers, led the team overall in tackles with 100, 14 for losses, and five quarterback pressures. Logan Bennett had 84 tackles and was second overall in team production. Bennett had 11 tackles for a loss, nine sacks and 17 quarterback pressures.

Terrell Perkins and Anthony Brown were big forces at the defensive end positions, with Perkins finishing with 60 tackles and Brown with 44. Ronnie Black had 38 tackles, Bryce Thornton finished with 57, J.J. Wilcox had 77 tackles on the year and Dewayne Robinson, out for several games with a sprained ankle, had 17. Ronnie Wooten who went both ways for the Makers had 21

tackles on defense. Scooby Bodiford had 48 and Johnathan Shine had 30.

The Syrupmaker defense really had no "stars," but 11 teammates who made plays. All through the season, other players like Mike Johnson, Allen Ash, Marcus Davis, Quentin Jones, Lester Harrell, Desmond Brown, Alex Brown, LaQuinton Williams, and even Angelo Pease, who came over from quarterback, played a big part in the overall play of the defense.

Bodiford led the defense with six interceptions, Shine had two, and Wilcox, Davis and Pease also had picks during the season.

It seemed that every team the Syrupmakers faced was bigger, much bigger at times, but nobody tackled better or hit harder. The Syrupmaker defense made their mark on the 2008 season, and left a few marks on opposing players.

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Special teams prove to be indeed "special"

Any football coach will tell you there are three phases of the game, and to be successful you need to win at least two of them. There is offense, defense and special teams. The Syrupmakers can attribute their success this season to the fact that they won all three phases of the game each week.

The Cairo special teams unit was loaded with experience. Kickers Garret Godwin and Logan Gainous are seniors, along with the extra point and field goal line of scrimmage deep snapper, Jake Elkins, and holder, J.J. Wilcox.

Elkins has been deep snapping for three years, and Wilcox has handled the holding duties.

Godwin, who was injured in the off season, was questionable at the beginning of the season, so Cairo coaches turned to their other senior kicker Logan Gainous. Because of Gainous' success at kicking extra points and field goals, the

coaches decided to allow Gainous to continue to handle those duties, while assigning Godwin punt and kickoff duties when he returned to action.

"We had two good kickers, so it was best to just let them share duties," said Cairo coach Tom Fallaw.

Godwin averaged over 31 yards a punt this season and handled all kickoffs. Gainous was 4-6 on field goals, and 57 of 61 on extra points on the season.

"We have been pleased with our special teams all season, but those guys are seniors and have played together so long, we knew we wouldn't have to worry about that part of the game," said Fallaw.

With 2:32 left in Saturday's game, it was Elkins, Wilcox and Gainous for the last time after Cairo's final touchdown, followed by one more Godwin kickoff.

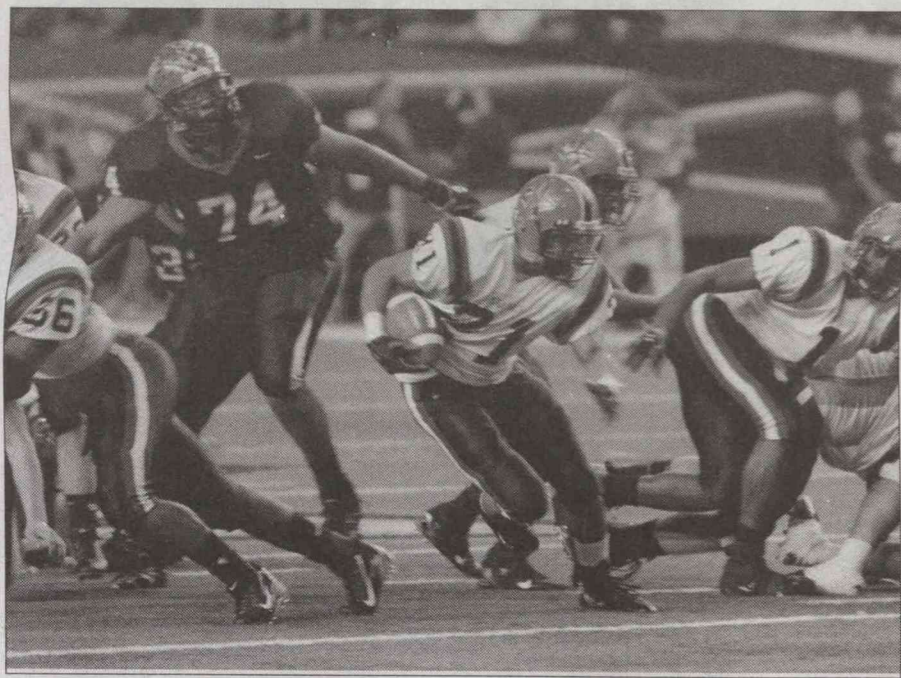

Class of 2009 had nothing but success

As the Syrupmakers counted down the final seconds of the state championship game in the Georgia Dome, it also marked the final seconds for this 2008 senior class of Syrupmaker football players.

With a look back over the history of Syrupmaker football that spans almost 90 years, a case could be made that this group of seniors may very well be one of, if not the best, group to don the red and black.

Here's why: there have been 11 seasons with 10 wins. This group of seniors were part of three of those seasons. No other team in Syrupmaker history won 10 or more games three years in a row.

Since their sophomore year, this group is 27-4. They lost two games at home last season and haven't lost on the road since 2006. This group beat Thomas County Central two of the three times they faced them, and never lost to Thomasville.

This group played in the first ever state championship hosted by Cairo. They are the only group to play for back-to-back state championships, and the only group to not only win one, but back-to-back games in the Georgia Dome.

This group of seniors won the region championship two of their three years as Syrupmakers, played in more state playoff games than any other team, and won more playoff games than any other team in school history.

There are only two teams that recorded perfect seasons, this group is one of them. There are only three teams in school history that won state championships, this group is one of them.

Cairo has enjoyed many years of success, but there is no doubt, this group of seniors will go down in Syrupmaker history as maybe the best of all.

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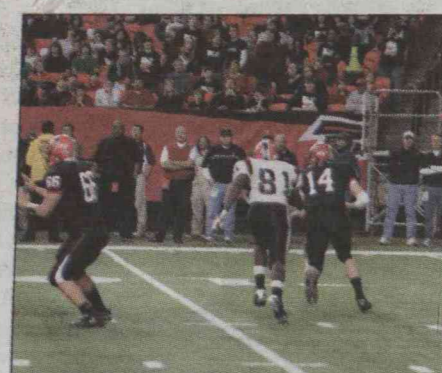
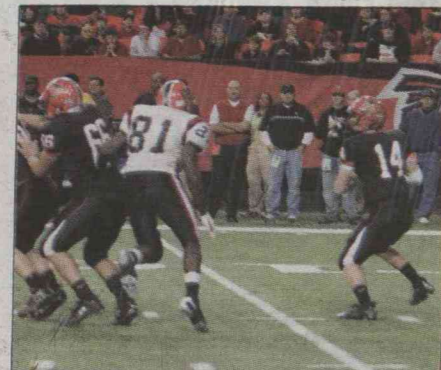
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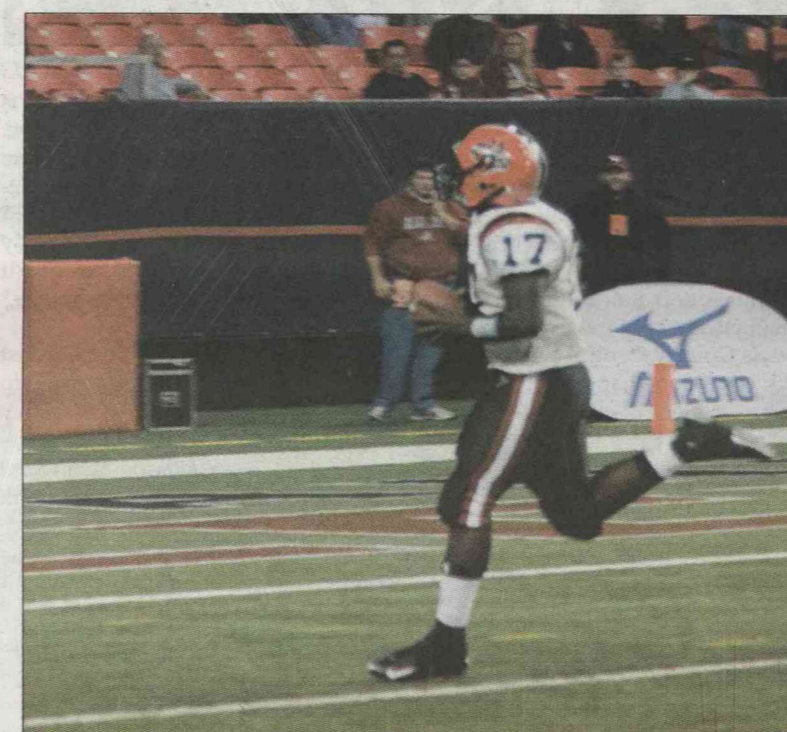

From the first day of the 2008-2009 school year, students, teachers and administrators knew the 2008 football season could bring home the third state championship in school history.

"We knew this had the possibility of being a championship year, based on the success of the program last year," said CHS Athletic Director Carlton Gainous.

Cairo High Principal David McCurry has nothing but praise for the school's extracurricular programs. "Our students always give their best in everything they do and, with the success of our football team, our band and cheerleaders have been put in the spotlight along with our football team, in fact, the success we've enjoyed has really promoted not only our whole school, but the community as well," said McCurry.

The Cairo High principal has also been impressed by the football players' actions off the field as well. "The reason these young men are champions on the football field is due in great part to their character. This year's group has had even higher expectations in the classroom because of graduation tests and end of course tests that weren't around back then, and they work very hard as well in the classroom," said Bibbes.

McCurry agrees, "With state-wide testing, and the expectations we have for our students in the classroom, I'm im-

pressed with how kids still find ways to compete with the best in the state, not only in sports, but band and drama and other extracurricular activities."

Cairo High School English teacher Betty Elkins, who taught at CHS in 1990 and this year, has enjoyed the spirit surrounding the football season. "There is nothing like it. Something like this just unites not only the school, but the entire community. We will always remember the 1990 state championship team, and now the 2008 team, it's been very exciting around here," Elkins said.

CHS teacher Barbara Godwin has a special interest in this year's team. Her son Garret is one of the Syrupmakers' kickers and is a senior this year, so the championship brought mixed emotions. "I was thrilled to see our boys win it but, at the same time, I realized that would be the last time Garret would dress out and kick for the Syrupmaker football team. It really hit me when the seniors came out for the coin toss," said Godwin.

One special treat for Godwin was getting to be on the sidelines for her son's last game. Godwin helped take pictures for the CHS yearbook, and got a close up view of all of the action. "It was a thrill of a lifetime to be so close to everything," she said.

All season long, varsity cheerleading coach Cheryl Simmons and the cheerleaders have decorated the halls with spirit signs, and Monday morning was no different. The halls of CHS were decorated with signs expressing the pride of not only the cheerleaders, but the entire student body in winning the state championship.

With all of the excitement of the championship still fresh on everyone's mind, one would expect Monday to be a wild and raucous day at CHS. However, Principal David McCurry was pleased with the day. "There was a buzz in the air, but everyone seems to be focused on preparing for end of course tests and final exams this week," said McCurry.

Thousands travel to Georgia Dome

Many fans from surrounding schools including Thomasville, Thomas County Central and Bainbridge made the trip and cheered for the Syrupmakers. Thomas County Central sent a red and black carnation-shaped horseshoe wishing the Makers good luck, and it was on display in the CHS lobby last week.

By kickoff Saturday afternoon, there were, by some estimates, between 8,000 to 10,000 cheering fans seated behind the Syrupmakers. "The fan support is incredible at every game, no doubt, but to see that many people in the stands Saturday was amazing and really gave our players a boost," said Cairo coach Tom Fallaw. The noise level on the field was deafening at times, according to coaches and players.

On Saturday morning, Interstate 75 was packed with caravans of Cairo fans making the trek to the Georgia Dome. Chartered buses and student buses were filled as well. CHS principal David McCurry said almost 3,000 tickets were sold by Cairo in advance. "We had a steady flow of ticket buyers all week and it picked up even more Friday morning," said McCurry.

The Georgia High School Association reported that over 24,000 tickets were sold for Saturday's games. From all reports heard, it appears the Georgia Dome will be the home of the state football finals for years to come.

City."

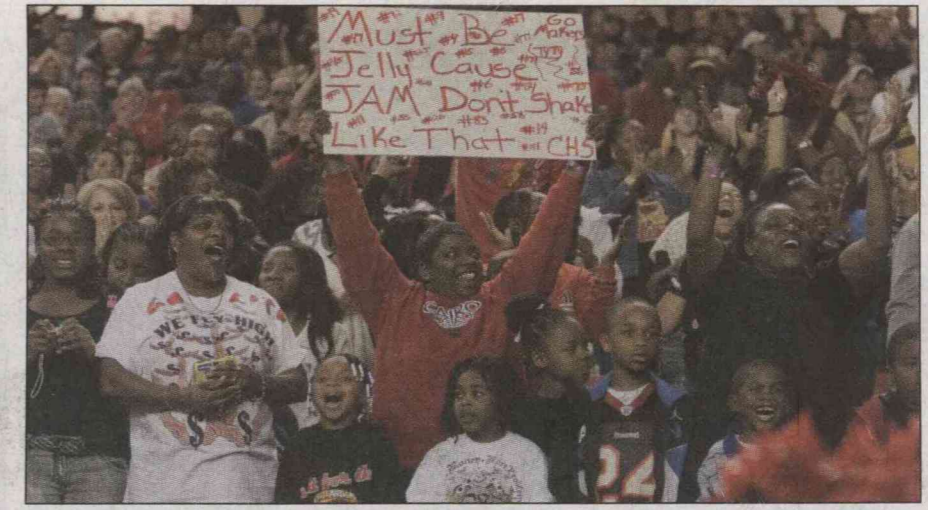

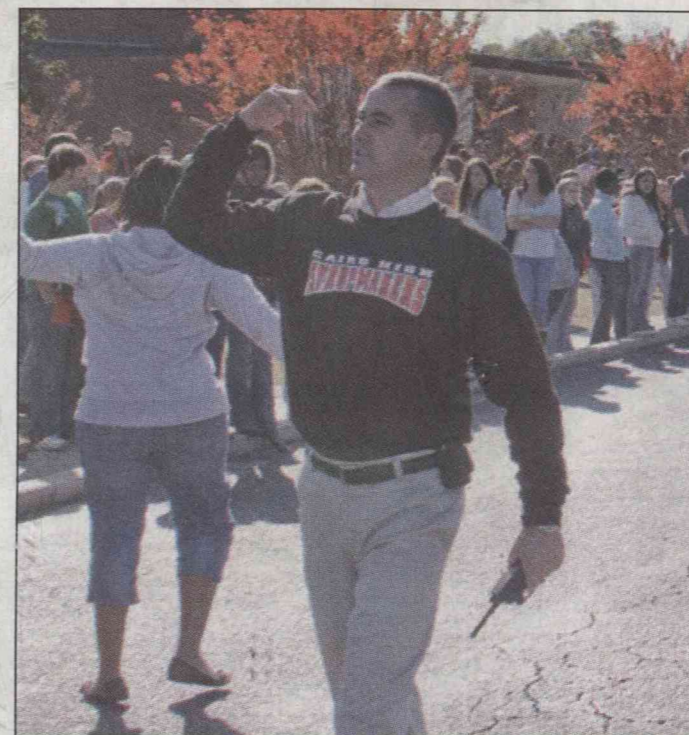

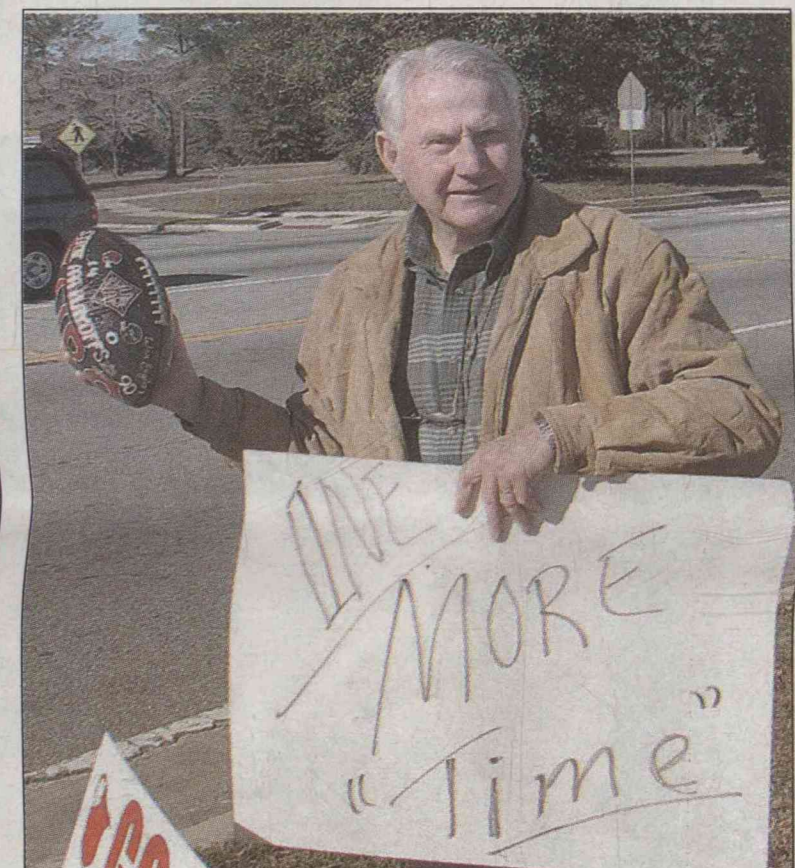

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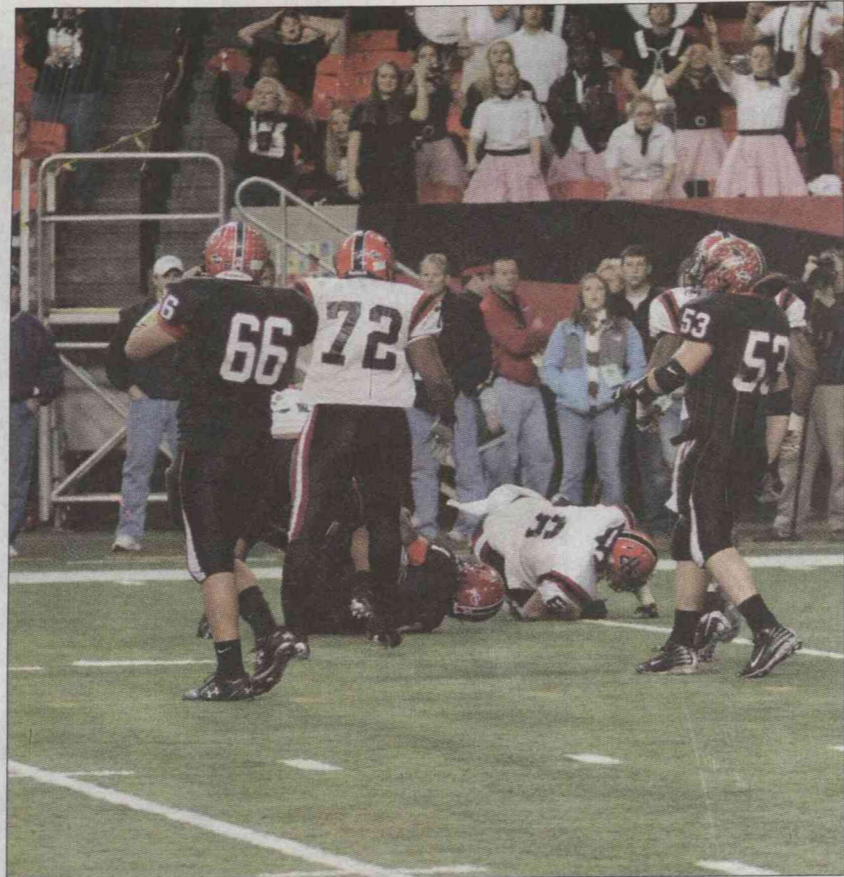

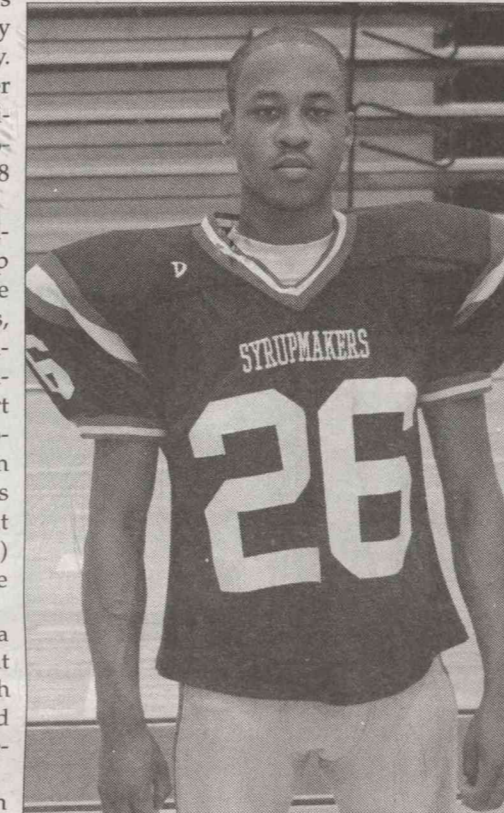

Saturday morning went by sooo slowly. From 7 a.m. until about 4 p.m. seemed to creep along. The closer it got to game time, the more my heart pounded.

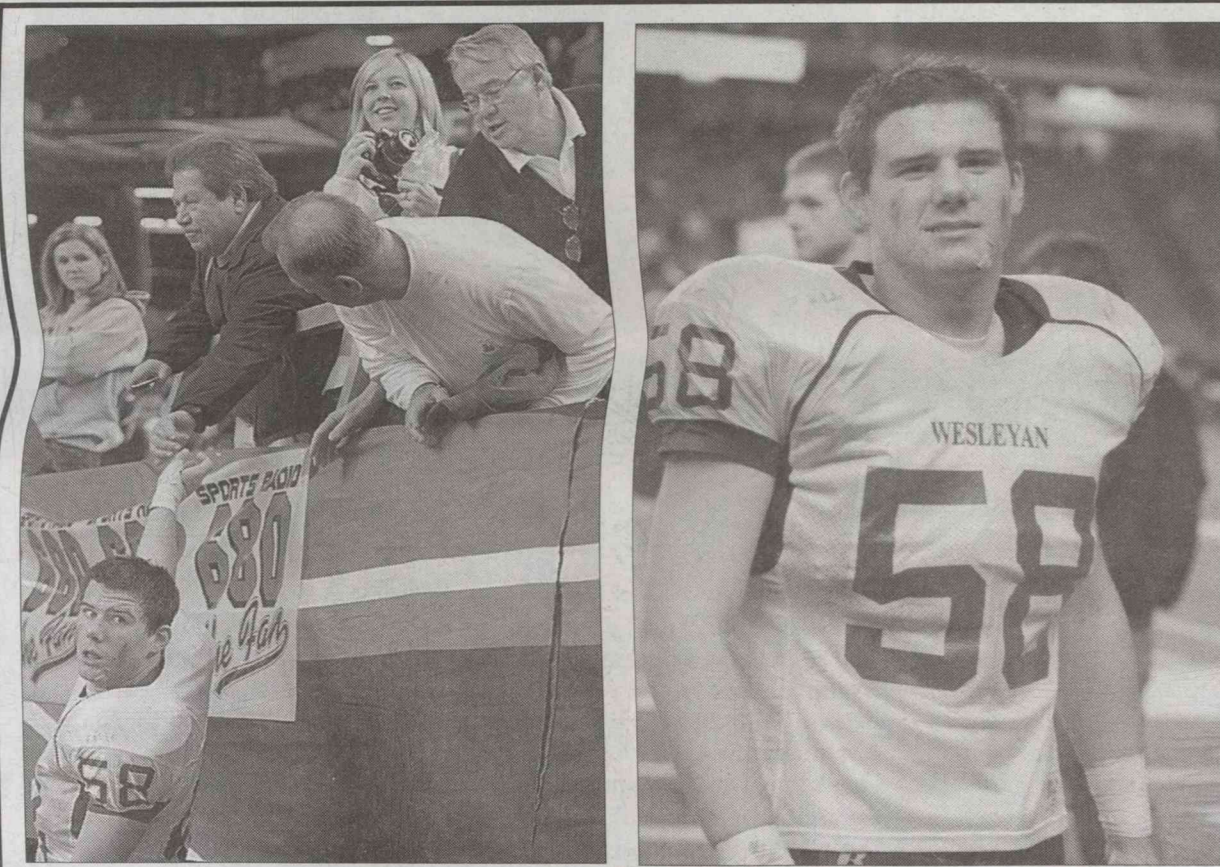

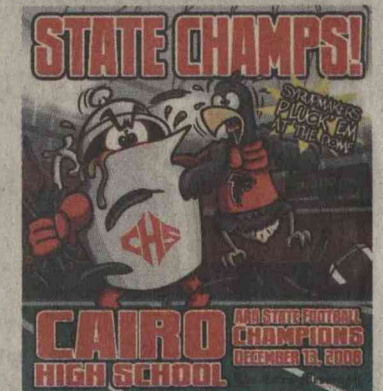
The entire community is invited to come out and celebrate the Syrupmakers' championship win over Flowery Branch.

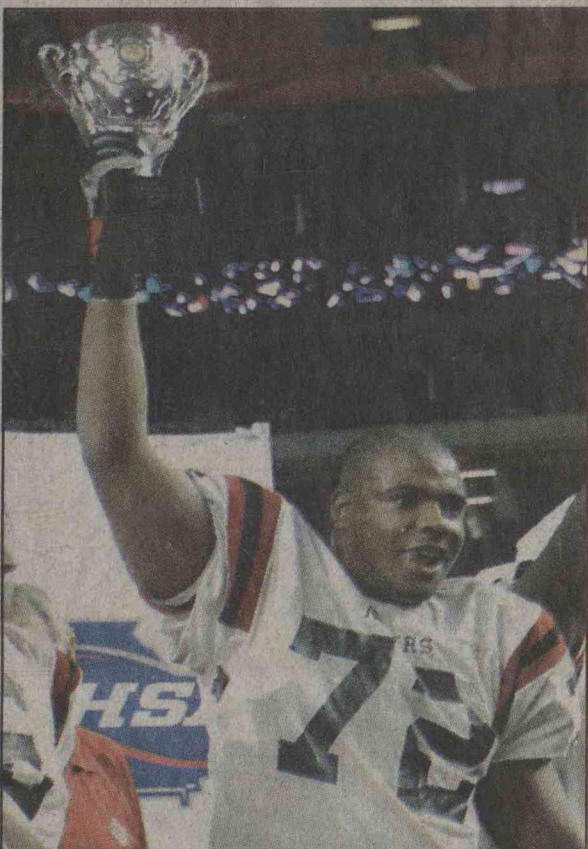
PERFECT ENDING

ATLANTA — The Cairo Syrupmakers are no longer second best. The Class AAA championship trophy is on its way to the Syrup City. Back in the state championship game for the second straight year, the Syrupmakers avenged last year's defeat and knocked off Flowery Branch 28-14 at the Georgia Dome to complete a 14-0 season. The state championship was Cairo's first since 1990.

"I've been looking for this for a long time with these guys right here and tonight we came out and showed we're the best in the state," running back Reginald Bryant said.

Linebacker Jake Elkins added, "I can't even think right now. It's unbelievable."

Cairo lost last year's championship game 16-13 to Carver-Columbus. From spring practice to the off season to this year, that loss served as motivation for the Syrupmakers.

"It was the driving force of the season," Cairo assistant coach Steve Dill said. "Up on our board in the weight room, we had helmets of every team we've played. We just talked about rivals, region and redemption. Redemption's kind of the key word for the playoffs for

us this year. I think we redeemed ourselves pretty well."

ATLANTA — Cairo needed a spark. A senior delivered it.

Leading 6-0 in the Class AAA final in the Georgia Dome on Saturday, Flowery Branch tried for a big play when it threw a long pass toward the end zone.

Flowery Branch coach Lee Shaw expressed no regrets about going for the touchdown, which came with the Falcons at the Syrupmakers 31.

"We were coming down here to win this thing," Shaw said. "We weren't going to come down here to play safe and be happy we were just here. We were

trying to win it. When you try to win it, sometimes you roll the dice and it goes your way, and sometimes it doesn't."

Early on, everything was going the Falcons' way. They employed a ball-control attack on their first two drives, tallying 116 yards. Both possessions ended in field goals, however.

"Flowery Branch did a good job of executing their offense," Fallaw said. "They came out and didn't make any mistakes. Our defense bent a little bit, but it didn't break."

Shaw added, "Touchdowns would have been better, but we were pretty happy about scoring points and putting the pressure on them."

The Syrupmakers rose to the challenge, using mostly rushes by quarterback Angelo Pease and running back Reginald Bryant for most of the 97 yards on their initial scoring drive. It was capped by Pease's 19-yard touchdown toss to De-

wayne Isom.

"We came into halftime and we weren't playing football like we were supposed to be playing," Pease said.

The second half looked more like Cairo football.

Bryant started the second half with a 43-yard jaunt, and on Cairo's next possession, Pease ripped off a 78-yard run up the middle to give the Syrupmakers an eight-point advantage.

After the Falcons tied the game on a touchdown toss from Connor Shaw to Chris Lipscomb, the Syrupmakers responded with a couple of touchdown drives in the

fourth quarter.

The Syrupmakers capped a 71-yard drive with a 17-yard pass from Pease to J.J. Wilcox. Pease finished with 93 yards passing and 93 yards on the ground. He also had an interception on Flowery Branch's last play of the game.

Plenty of ways to experience the Makers Saturday

If you can't make it to the Georgia Dome Saturday afternoon for the state championship game, don't panic. There are several other ways to experience the game.

The Syrupmakers will be on WGRA Saturday with an expanded two-hour pregame show starting at 3 p.m., and the kickoff live at 5 p.m. Fans out of range of WGRA can tune to the Internet by going to www.wgra.net and following the icons to the gaprep website for the live broadcast.

The Syrupmakers will also be on Georgia Public Television at 5 p.m., as well.

Don't miss the big game! Tune into Michael Best and Blair Dickenson for all of the action, and see it live on TV.

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The Amazing Georgia Dome

Since the 1990s, the Georgia Dome has been the home to the GHSA state semifinal football games. This year, the GHSA has moved the state championships to the big house in Atlanta. A total of five games will be played in the Dome over two days.

The class AA final will be held at 5 p.m., Friday, with the class AAAA final being played at 8 p.m. On Saturday, the class A final match will begin the day at 2 p.m., with Cairo and Flowery Branch playing in the AAA final at 5 p.m. and the class AAAAA final coming at 8 p.m. Saturday night.

Cairo has played in the Georgia Dome four times in the past, winning their first game ever in the facility last year over North Hall. Flowery Branch will be making their first trip to the Dome this Saturday.

The Georgia Dome is the largest cable supported domed stadium in the world and is unique in many ways. A total of 8,300 tons of reinforced steel was used to construct the Dome, that is more than the weight of iron and steel in the Eiffel Tower. A 437-mile sidewalk could be built from Atlanta to Cincinnati from the 110,000 cubic feet of concrete used at the Dome. The building covers 8.9 acres and contains 1.6 million square feet on all seven levels.

The Georgia Dome's roof is 290 feet high and is composed of 130 Teflon-coated fiberglass panels. The roof's supporting cables total 11.1 miles and the Dome is as tall as a 27-story building.

The four 1,250 ton air conditioners generate enough power to cool 1,666 homes, and there are over 600 television monitors scattered throughout the stadium. There are also 789 light fixtures in the roof structure to provide

lighting to the massive structure. To supply the many soft drink dispensers, thousands of liquid lines wind through the stadium, 32,952 feet of lines all together - that's the length of 109 football fields.

Inside the Georgia Dome there are eight Super Suites, 164 Executive Suites, the Penthouse Suite, and 4,600 Club Level seats. The Dome has enough permanent seating for 71,250 fans. A pair of C-5 military transport planes could fit on the Georgia Dome floor, which covers 102,000 square feet of space.

For Cairo fans, seating will be on the visitors' side, which is the south side of the Dome.

Gates A & D will be the only gates open for admission. Tickets are \$15 in advance and \$20 at the door. Tickets are good for one day only and are bar coded and can only be used once.

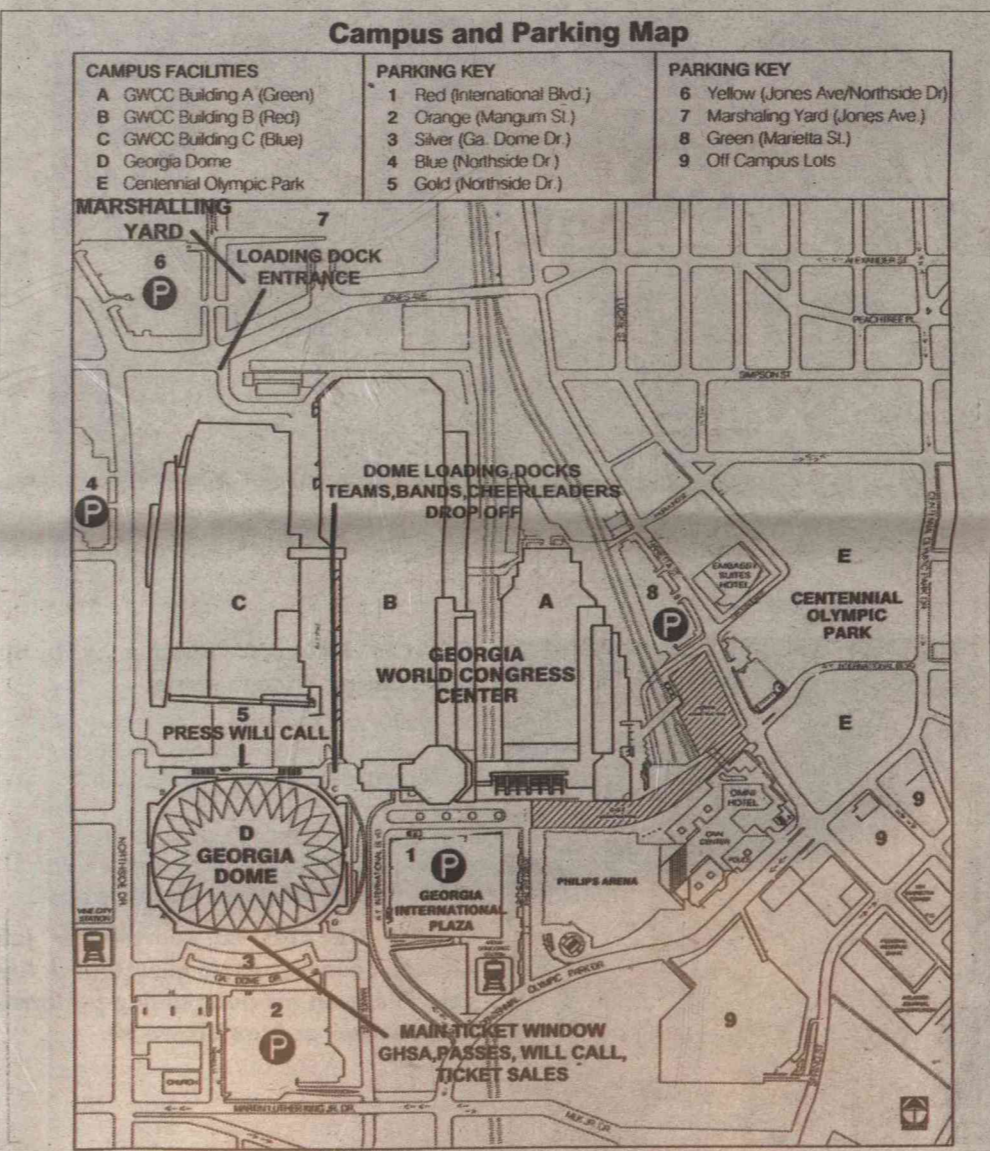
AAA schools have 5,000 tickets available for presale and are now on sale at Cairo High School through Friday during regular school hours.

There's nothing better than playing the biggest game of the season in a home town stadium somewhere in Georgia but, for now, it's off to Atlanta for the first ever state finals in the Georgia Dome.

DIRECTIONS TO GEORGIA DOME

The Georgia Dome is located to the immediate west of the downtown Atlanta area on the corner of Northside Drive and Georgia Dome Drive, according to their website. The Dome is also accessible by the MARTA rail system via Vine City and Georgia Dome stations. The site states parking is at a premium on event days, so taking MARTA is recommended.

Driving directions from I-75 north bound, take Exit 248C - International Boulevard. Turn left onto Centennial Olympic Park Drive. Turn right onto Martin Luther King Drive. Turn right onto Northside Drive.

Lots of preparation goes into championship game

Preparing for the championship game in the Georgia Dome can be a quite a big task. Cairo coach Tom Fallaw and CHS Athletic Director Carlton Gainous met with Dome officials early Sunday morning to finalize all plans. Television interviews have been done, background information on the team has been given and itineraries have been discussed and planned. The Dome officials have, literally, every moment planned out in detail.

After arriving back in Cairo, transportation issues are worked out, hotel accommodations are made and meal locations are decided.

The Cairo coaching staff spent Sunday afternoon and evening breaking down film and developing a game plan as they do every week. Coaches like to keep things as routine as possible, so this week's practices will be much like every other practice. As with Saturday games, the team was given Monday off, and the practice schedule shifts one day.

The players will have regular practices on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, with a walkthrough Friday morning before leaving.

Playing inside the Georgia Dome is obviously different from an outside stadium in the weather, but after a few plays everyone adjusts, according to Cairo running back Reginald Bryant. "It's a great place to play because you know you've done everything you needed to do to get there. Once you start playing, it's like being anywhere else, you still have to make the plays," said Bryant.

Running back Ronnie Wooten said he loves playing in the Dome. "I love running on that turf, it really helps you run faster," said Wooten. Bryant agreed, "Oh yeah, it makes you a step faster, you can't tell that."

Noise is another factor, according to some of the players. "It gets really loud in there. It's a lot different from playing anywhere else," said Wooten. "The noise is great, it gets louder in

there than anywhere else we play," said Montavious Williams. "The crowd noise is something else," said Bryant with a smile.

Being tackled to the turf sometimes leaves skin burns, but that doesn't get in the way of game performance. "The turf will scrape you up and burn you, but you don't even think about that until after the game," said Bryant. "It gets pretty hot in there, too, down on the field," said Williams.

Cairo will travel to Atlanta Friday morning after their walkthrough practice. After checking in the hotel the team will go to the Dome to watch some football and get used to the Dome atmosphere. After watching some of the AAAA state final, the team will return to the hotel for a good night's sleep.

The pregame meal and devotion will be done around lunch time in the hotel and then the team will depart, arriving at the Dome about 2:45 to prepare for the 5 p.m. kickoff.

Traveling is quite an endeavor as well. Equipment, video gear, player's bags, coolers, kicking net, and extra helmets and supplies must be packed and loaded on the equipment truck prior to departure. The team travels in an entourage of three or four buses plus the equipment truck and members of the Grady County Sheriff's Department.

Coaches are stopped many times in restaurants and hotels to be complimented on the player's behavior. As one lady said in a restaurant in Albany last Friday, "I've taught school for 33 years, and I've never seen such a well-behaved group of young men."

The team will depart Friday morning at 11 a.m., everyone is invited to Cairo High School or along Broad Street to give them a rousing farewell as they set out to win the AAA state championship, a feat accomplished only two other times in Cairo High School history.

One of Georgia's most noted newspaper columnists is banking on another Hall County team beating the Syrupmakers Saturday, even though it didn't work out that well last year.

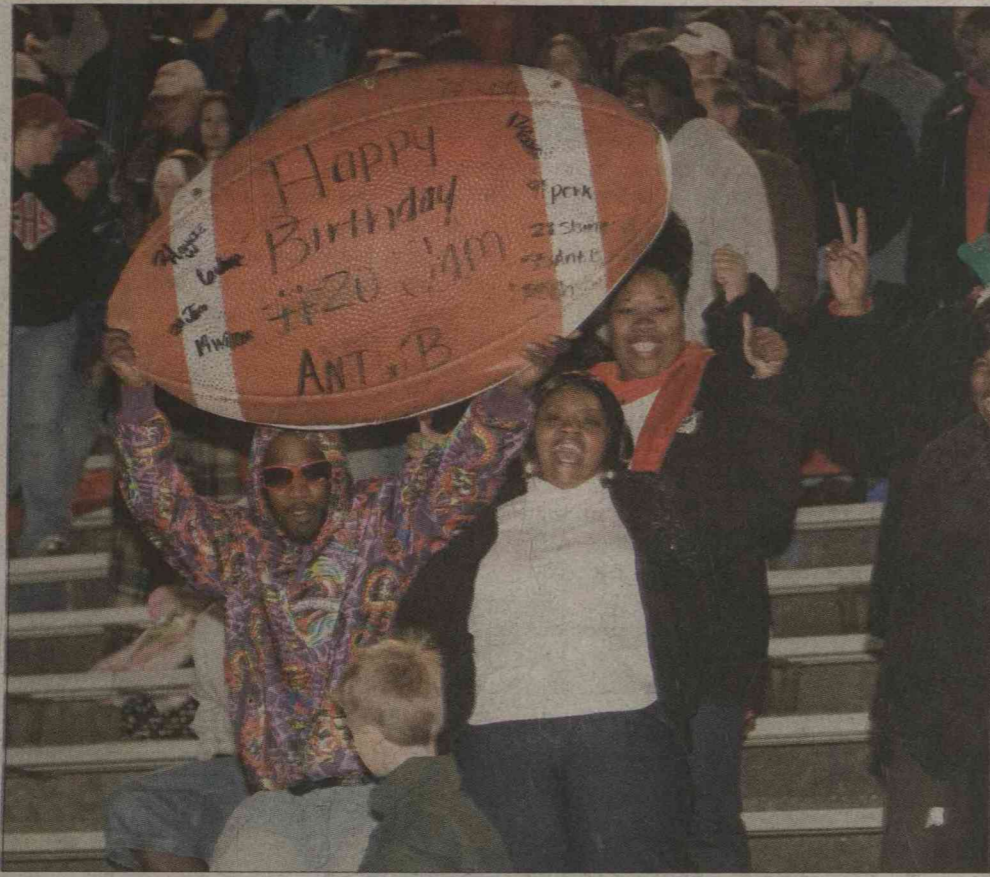
Messenger readers will recall that the Syrupmakers were triumphant last year over North Hall which, like Flowery Branch, is located in Hall County.

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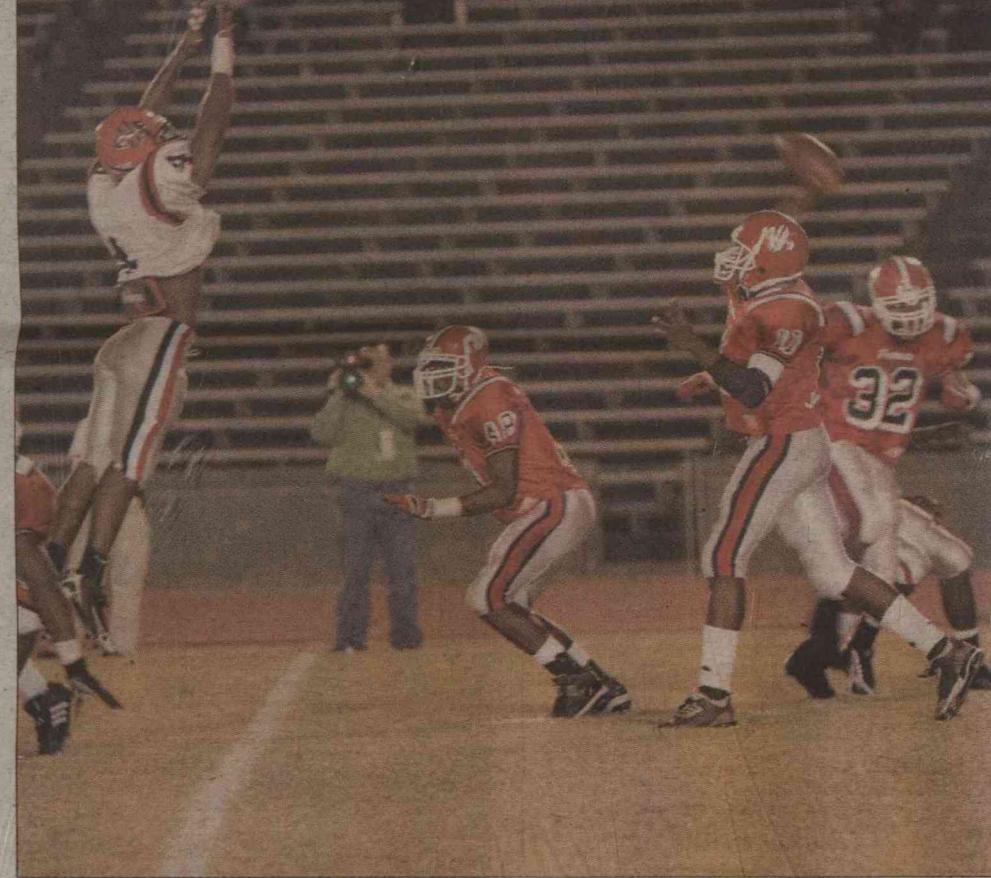

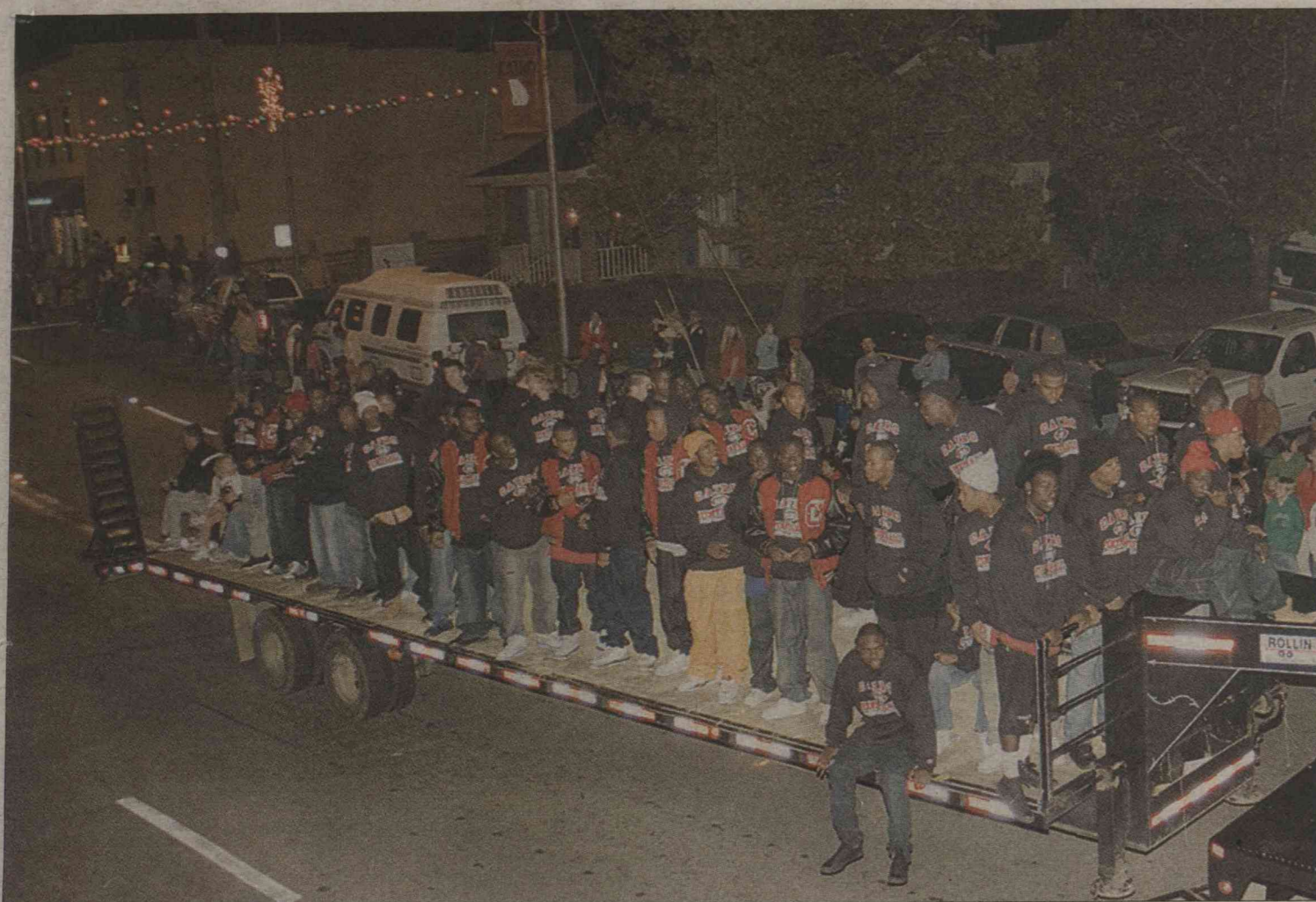

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Syrupmakers tame Carver Tigers 42-13

Cairo to play in Georgia Dome for state title Saturday

Last Friday night's Cairo-Carver semifinal football game before 10,000 plus fans at Columbus' Memorial Stadium featured the same two teams that played in last year's state championship finale won 16-13 by the Tigers. However, that was the only similarity to last season. This year was all Cairo, as the Makers handed the Tigers their worst defeat since 2005, 42-13, to advance to the state finals to be played in the Atlanta dome this Saturday.

The Syrupmakers began the day with a grand send off by the CHS student body in the front drive of CHS that even had well wishes from the students at Southside Elementary School who filled their playground and waved and cheered as the Syrupmaker buses passed their school. "That was big, it really meant a lot to our players to see their fellow students out there, and all those young kids screaming for them," said Cairo coach Tom Fallaw.

Scooby Bodiford returned the Tigers' opening kickoff to the Carver 18-yard stripe to start the game, but Cairo could not move the ball any farther, missing a field goal wide left. The Maker defense then held the Tigers and forced a punt that pinned the Makers at their own three-yard line. The Syrupmakers drove the ball out of the shadow of the goal posts, but bogged down and had to punt.

Cairo scored after Montavious Williams forced a fumble by the Carver quarterback and fell on it at the Carver three-yard line. Cairo took the lead when Reginald Bryant bulled in to give Cairo a 7-0 lead with Logan Gainous' extra point.

The Syrupmaker defense held the Tigers on the next possession, forcing them to punt. Cairo then drove to the Carver five-yard line, but fumbled at the two-yard line. Carver took the turnover and drove the ball 99 yards, scoring on a 45-yard run with 7:20 to go in the second quarter to tie the game at seven.

Cairo next scored on a six-yard pass from Angelo Pease to Dewayne Isom and a 20-yard pass to Chris Adams, who got open in the back of the end zone as Pease scrambled away from pressure. With the extra points,

Cairo took a 21-7 lead to the locker room at the half.

The second half began with Carver's second turnover on the night as Garret Godwin's kick off was mishandled at the 20-yard line, and Cairo wasted little time taking advantage of the miscue. Reginald Bryant went in from five yards out and Gainous' extra point gave Cairo a 28-7 lead with 10:39 to play in the third quarter.

The Syrupmakers looked well on their way to a big rout when they coughed up another fumble. The Tigers responded by scoring on a five-yard run with 3:37 to play in the quarter. However, the Tigers would return the favor one series later. Trailing 13-28, the Tigers were driving to close the gap to a touchdown, when they fumbled the ball at the Maker 23-yard line and Bodiford fell on the loose pigskin. Pease then raced 77 yards for another Maker touchdown to give Cairo a 35-13 lead.

The Tigers turned the ball over three times on the night, and the Makers wasted little time capitalizing each time. "That was big, those turnovers," Fallaw said. "Those kind of things early gave us the momentum. We got rolling pretty good and made it 21-7 before half."

Pease threw for two touchdowns and ran for two more, rushing for 181 yards on the night. All of this after being involved in a minor car accident after the Cairo Christmas Parade the night before. "It was scary," Pease said. "I had an accident and went to the hospital but everything was all right, and I came out here and just played my best."

Pease's last touchdown on the night came with 4:57 to play in the game on a 12-yard run to give Cairo a 42-13 win.

Reginald Bryant, celebrated his 18th birthday on Friday with 101 yards rushing and two touchdowns. Bryant was serenaded with a "Happy Birthday" song by the entire student body during a morning pep rally. "It was a great birthday present," Bryant said of his big day.

Chris Adams and Dewayne Isom had a touchdown each, and Pease was 7 of 11 for 124 yards. The Cairo defense held the Tigers to just 282 yards of offense, with 21 yards through the air.

With the win, the Syrupmakers advance to the AAA state championship at the Georgia Dome Saturday afternoon at 5 p.m. against Flowery Branch.

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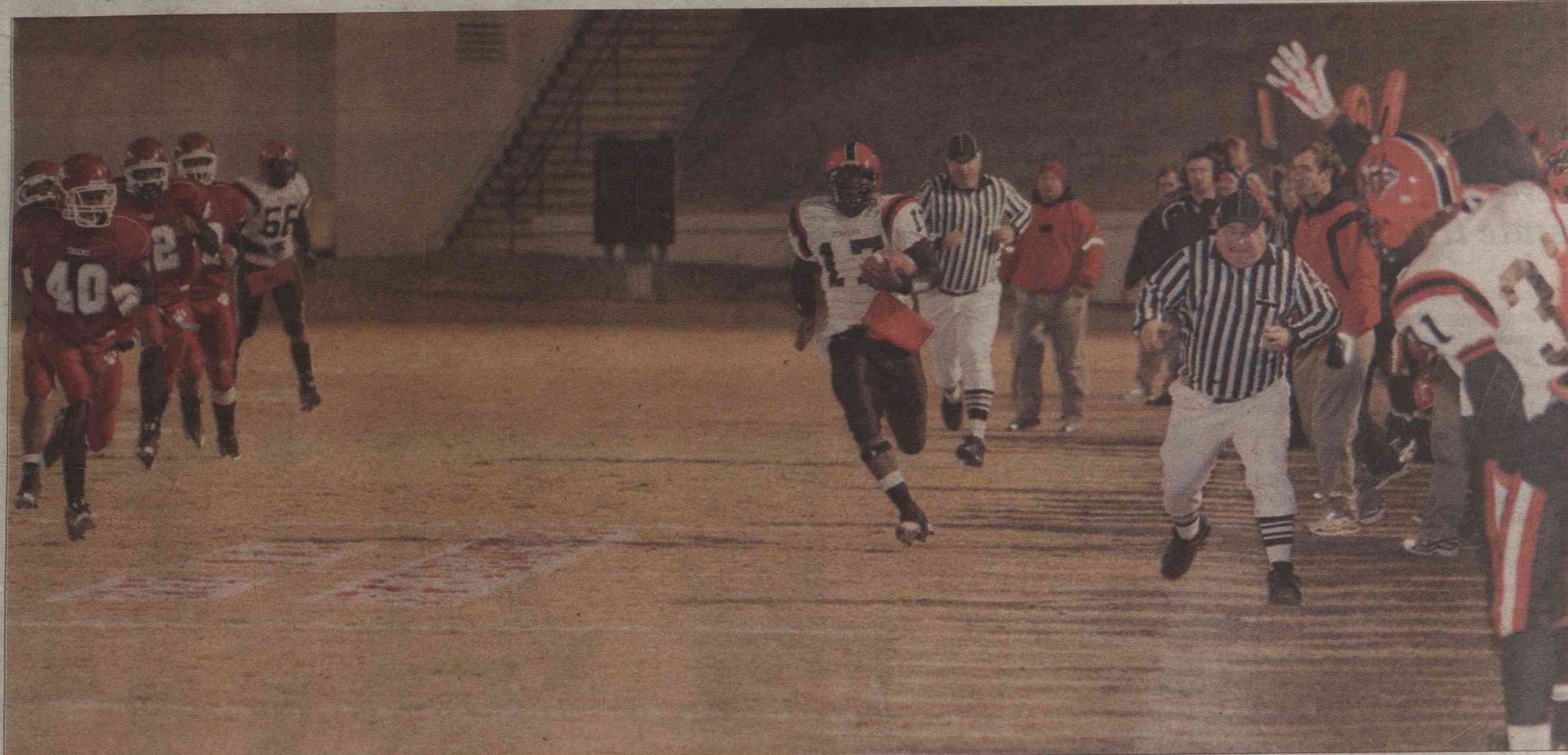

THOMASVILLE — Two days after his team's 28-14 state football championship win over Flowery Branch, Cairo head coach Tom Fallaw was still soaking in its undefeated 14-0 season.

"It's been great right now. Everybody's happy," Fallaw said Monday. "I think we put a lot of hard work into this. It's always good when the hard work pays off. It certainly did this year, and it did last year, to a point, too."

The Syrupmakers entered the season with expectations at an all-time high thanks to last year's Class AAA runner-up finish to Carver-Columbus. Cairo

returned 28 seniors, many of which were starters. The season didn't go exactly according to plan, however.

Cairo's opening game with Bainbridge was cancelled because of Tropical Storm Fay, forcing it to start a week late at Thomas County Central. Coupled with a pair of bye weeks, the Syrupmakers played only two games before their Sept. 26 matchup against Monroe.

"Just to have that much (senior) experience, I think, car-

ried us through all that," Fallaw noted. "From the season being delayed, to as far as we made it all the way to the championship, I think our kids have been there and done it and just kind of knew what to expect."

Once the Syrupmakers' season got going, it wasn't stopped. Cairo played 12 straight weeks, won 11 games by at least double digits, claimed the Region 1 championship and then its third state title on Saturday after beating Flowery Branch 28-14.

"You get in this to be the best, and it's pretty hard to do," Fallaw said. "When it happens you just try to sit back and take it all in and enjoy it. It's one of those things that, it's a good feel-

ing, you want to remember it, and I'm sure we will for the rest of our lives. It's a good thing."

Cairo also won state titles in 1946 and 1990.

■ **CELEBRATION TIME:** Cairo will hold a special celebration on Thursday to recognize the football team. It will take place at West Thomas Stadium at 6 p.m.

"It's just a way to show our appreciation to them," said Cairo Principal David McCurry. "They've put in a lot of work this season, not just the players, but the coaches as well."

McCurry said Cairo Mayor Richard VanLandingham will be in attendance to give a congratulatory speech.



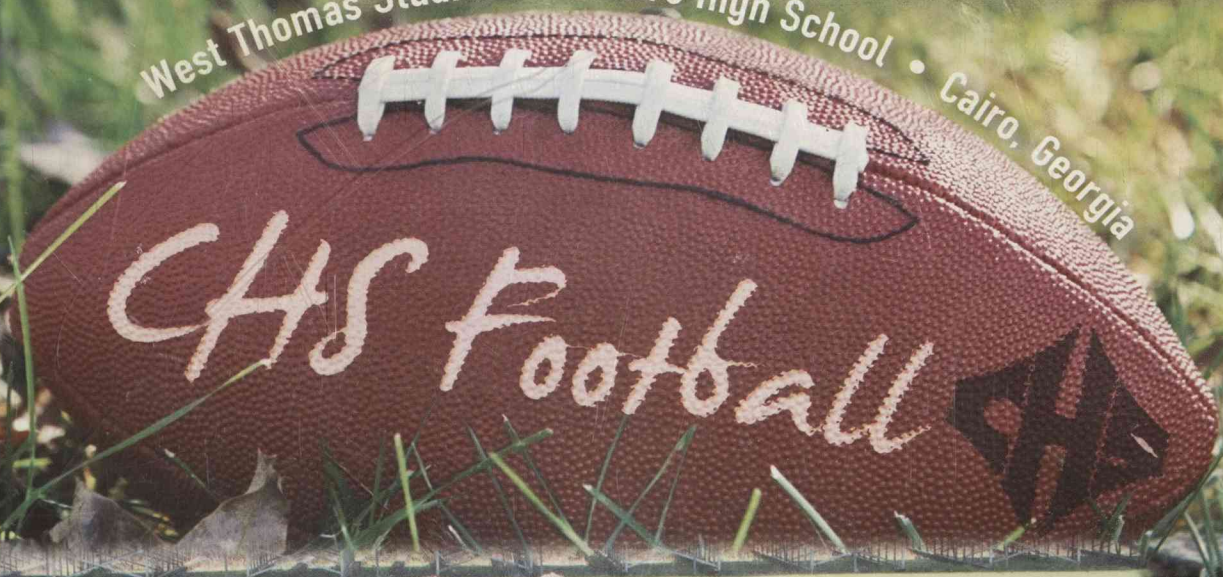
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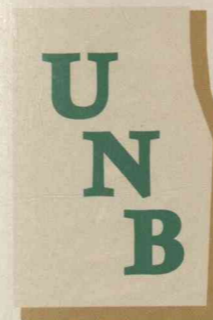
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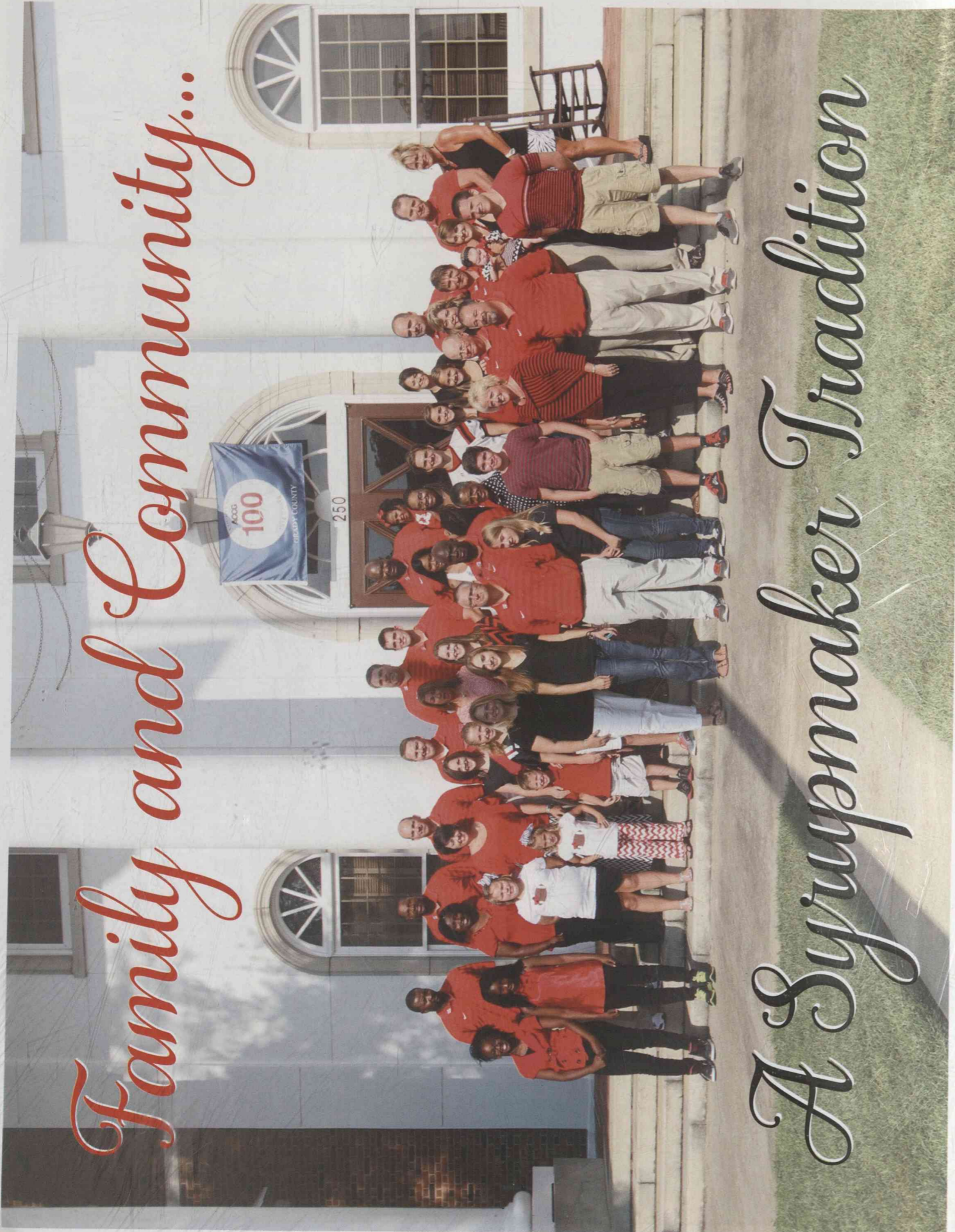

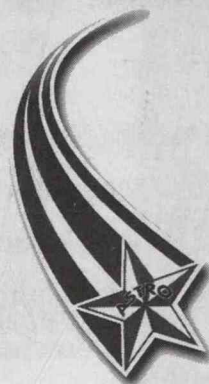
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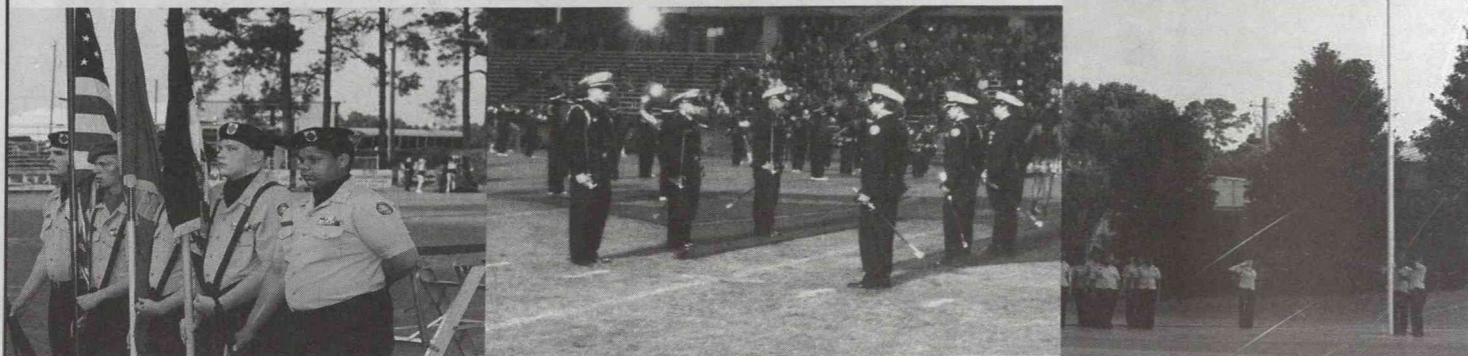
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NJROTC

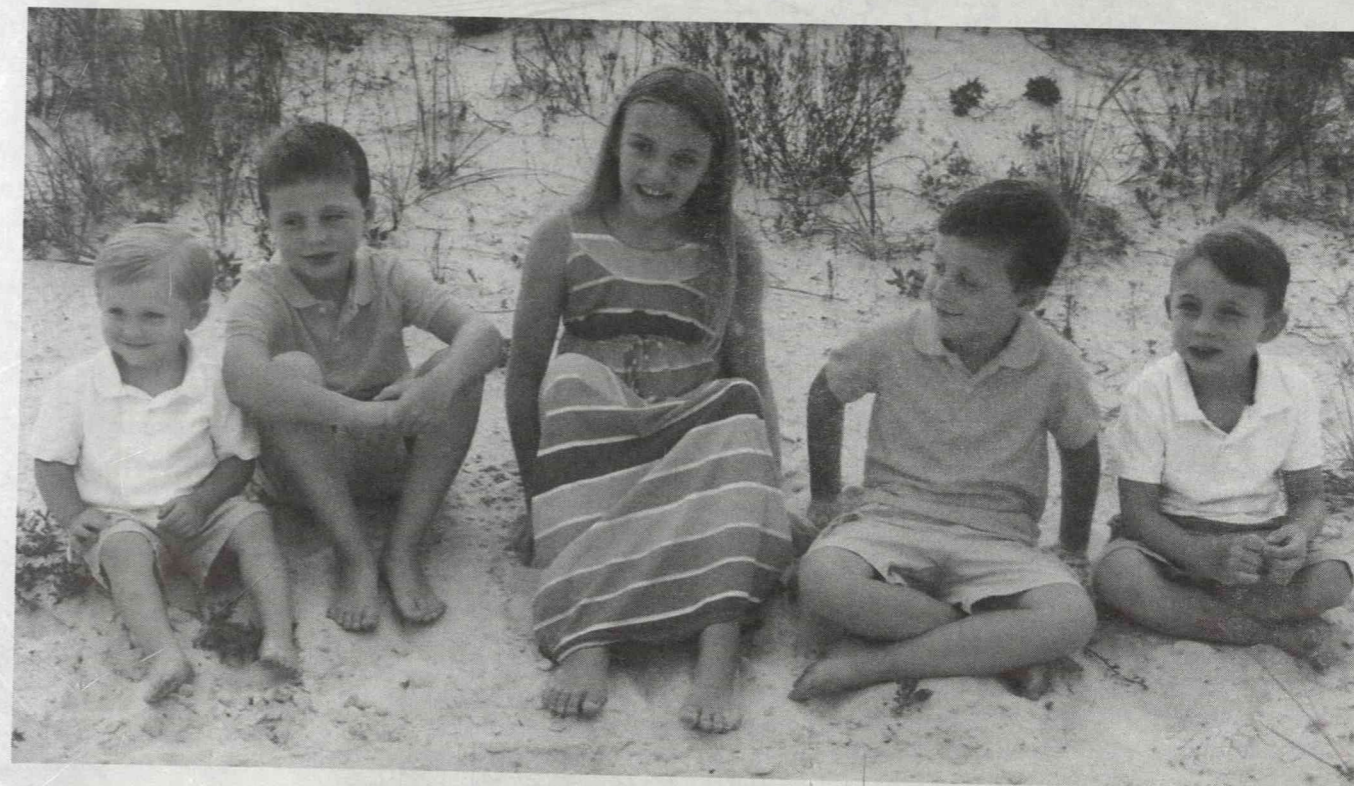

The Cairo High School Navy Junior ROTC will be there every game this season to back the Red and Black.




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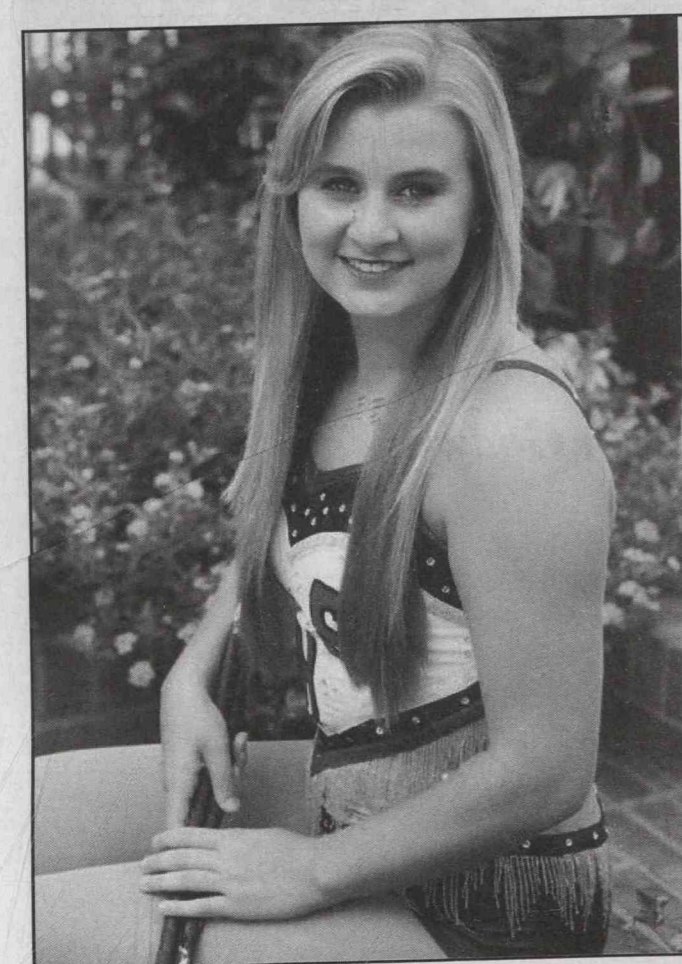
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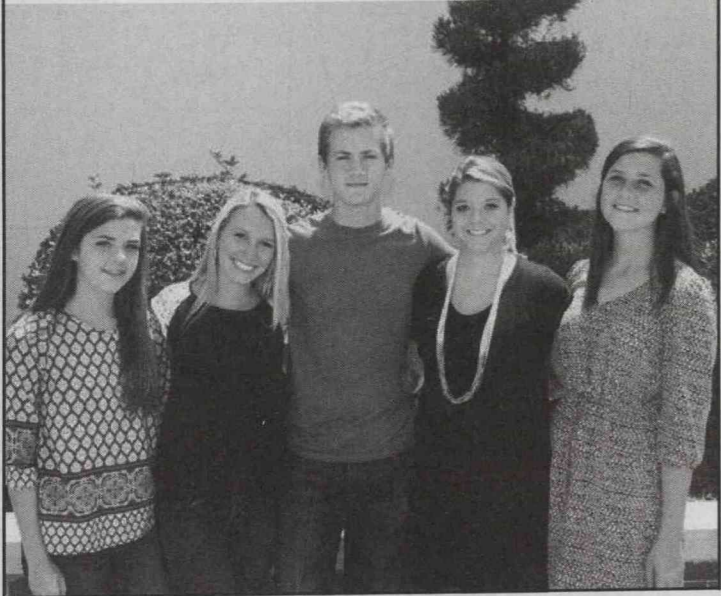


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


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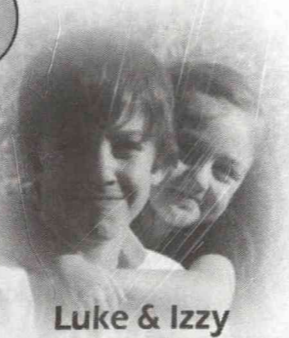
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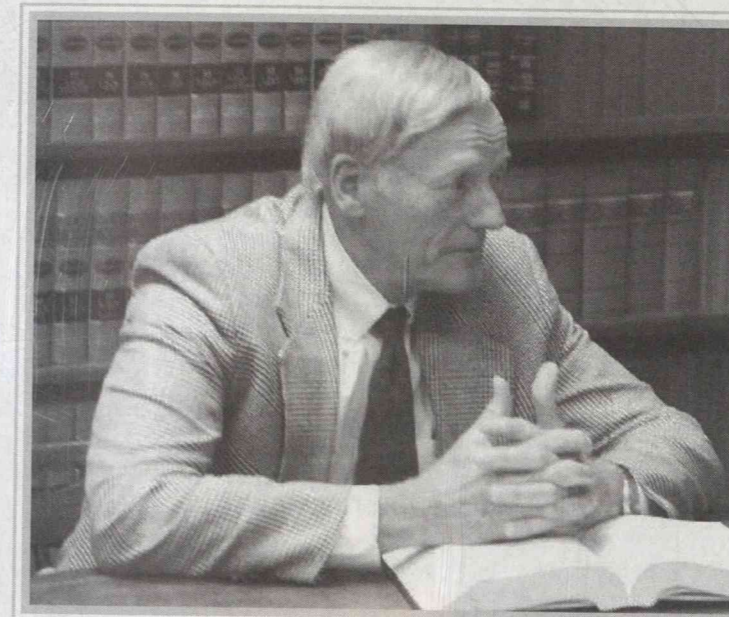

Now as we depart, we wish to leave this one challenge to our under-classmen, don't stop until you have reached the peaks of success.
