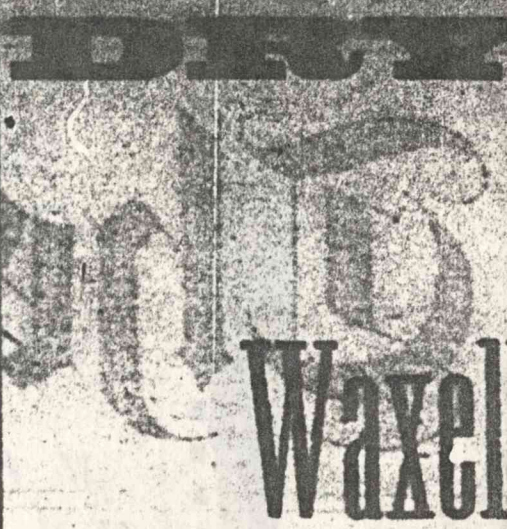

### BUSINESS SCHOOL IN CAIRO LIKELY

Branch Of Atlanta Institution For  
Cairo Contemplated, If Enroll-  
ments Are Obtained.

Mr. B. Dixon Hall, president of the Atlanta Business College, announces in a page advertisement in this issue of The Messenger that a branch of the Atlanta institution will be opened in Cairo on Monday week, October 28th, provided sufficient enrollments are secured in advance of the opening date.

Mr. Hall is a native Georgian and has devoted twenty-five years of his life to educational work. His school was established in 1905 and is highly commended. Prominent local leaders including J. P. Swann, County Superintendent of Schools, J. H. Morrison, superintendent of the Cairo schools, J. B. Wight, president, and M. Hughes, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, have endorsed the plan to establish a branch school here, as well as the kind of work done by the Atlanta college. The local leaders point out that if the young people in this section can be trained here, so that they can remain at home, it will be decidedly advantageous.

All who are interested are asked to communicate with Mr. Hall immediately. The coupon in the advertisement may be used and sent by mail to Mr. Hall at Cairo.

The Messenger was advised Thursday by the Treasury Department of the State of Georgia that the State Highway Department has not yet certified to that office the mileage for the quarter ending September 30th, 1929, on which the gas tax refund for the last quarter of the year will be prorated. Cashier H. A. Dixson, of the Treasury Department, stated, however, that Chief Engineer Seward Smith, of the Highway Department, had advised him that the mileage would be certified in a day or two—"on a revised basis in accordance with the Act of the 1929 Legislature."

This is taken to mean that the Pelham-Cairo-Beachton route will be included in the certified mileage, since its inclusion in the state system is authorized under the Act of the 1929 Legislature referred to.

The Messenger inquired of the Treasury Department about the mileage, because, although the State Highway Board promised to include the Grady county link, some felt that it would not be done in time for the refund to this county for this quarter to include the additional mileage here. The increase will almost double this county's state highway mileage.

### No Action Taken On New Survey Here.

Although a Chamber of Commerce committee was named three weeks ago to handle the matter of the proposed new route for State Route 38 at Cairo, no action had been taken by the committee Thursday.

The new survey, made recently, calls for this highway to skim the northeastern edge of Cairo rather than use Bryan and North Broad streets, as at present. The new proposed route is objected to by the committee.
