

With more than 200 pieces, he has won prizes and recognition throughout the Southeast.





vorld ... where we must learn to share our space and accommodate each ther," said Ms. Smit.





'The Foreigner,' Hilarious And Remarkable Play

In the South, we respect what we don't know. We are wary and though respectful, we give trust slowly. Trust must be earned.

In "The Foreigner," Valdosta Theatre Guild's current production, this Southern custom beguilingly reels a hilariously realistic tale from Betty Meek's Fishing Lodge. Local talent, Mary Ann Green, portrays a naive, active widow who tussles with retirement dreams, but must sell home and livelihood.

Having pinned her hopes of real estate freedom on fellow boarders, Catherine Simms and Simms' fiance, the Rev. David Lee, the widow con-centrates on the happy and fulfilling aspects of her life: stifling friends with her motherly love and concern. The play weaves a complicated web of misaligned plots and absurd per-sonalities that remind me of my own

Theatre Guild's own Rick Patrick transforms into an English military bloke affectionately named "Froggy" who jumps like one each time he greets Betty. Patrick's affected accent and antics clearly show his ver-

satility as a live stage performer.

Froggy's introverted friend, Charlie, is the "fer-en-ner" Betty takes under her protective wing and whose assumed ignorance of the English language creates a haven for honest-to-God prejudice to surface. Valdosta High School's Ricardo Ipina plays the enigmatic Charlie, giving a daring performance ranging his dialogue from finite to infinite, dramatically characteristic of PMS mood swings.

Oddly attracted to the foreigner is former Lowndes High School's Jennifer Clark. This Catherine is an extroverted "screamer" whose Southern debutante reputation would sourly viewed if all knew what bundles of secrets she carried under her sweater, a gift of the self-righteous Rev. Lee. This snake is reminiscent of the days of Tammy Faye Baker. Best display of nervous antics goes to this wily actress whose couch-punching scene reflects more than pre-nupital blues.

Notably honored Jim Britt gives another superb type-casted to perfection performance as the good ole boy out to make a buck. His clandestine actions prove a smile is truly only skin deep.

"I was the Hero" award goes to none other than the young Ellard Simms. Mark Daugherty's perfect interpretation of naive, good-hearted, sweet-natured half-witted or confused teen-ager added to the slap-stick flavor of this colloquial play. One won't have to guess which one Ellard is; he's the one who reminds you of

It's a good bet you'll enjoy this truly remarkable play. Performances continue at 8 p.m. today through Saturday at the Valdosta Playhouse downtown. For reservations, call 24-STAGE. Ta Ta, for now.

Winged impressions artist flocks to sculpting birds

VALDOSTA — Local artist Wilby Coleman has an exhibit titled "Twelve Strange Birds" on display at First Union Bank, 300 N. Patterson

St., for one more week. The metal bird sculptures are made from everything from pitchforks to bowling balls to parts of mule plows. The 12 sculptures are part of a large collection of sculptures Coleman has been producing for the last six years.

"Al Hayes, president of First Union, asked me to bring in the exhibit," said Coleman. "The reason he wanted to do it was because the Leadership Lowndes class was having a party at the bank, and he wanted some form of entertainment for them.

"All the birds except a few move, either bouncing or jumping or turning on springs. Al likes that stuff and thinks it's pretty funny. He has a pretty good sense of humor. People are welcome to touch and jiggle them to make them move because most of them do some-

Included in the exhibit inside the bank are sculptures that run from the almost totally abstract to the reasonably abstract, said

There are blue-footed boobies, a penguin, an attack chicken, single tree birds made from parts of a mule plow, and a very abstract chicken emerging from an egg titled "Which Came

Coleman said most of the sculptures took him from three to 10 days to complete, depending on the project, but others took him practically no time to make. He works on his sculptures seven to eight hours a day, seven days a

A retired lawyer after practicing for 37 years, he said his sculpture work is a lot more fun than practicing law. He said he got into sculpting six years ago while still practicing law, but when practicing law started to interfere with his art, he decided it was time to quit.

"The only time I can't work on my sculptures is when it's raining real hard," said Coleman. "It's not safe to be out in the rain welding. When I can't work on them, I go inside and read. I like to read novels. I'm reading a series of historical novels by Patrick O'Brian right now that are absolutely marvelous. I'd recommend them to anyone.

"This was an easy show to do because the sculptures were easy to move. They'll be up probably another week so everyone can go see them. I was delighted when Al asked me to do this, and it would please me if everyone liked them. This has been fun to do."

Miracles of Mexican Folk Art: Retablos and Ex-votos

VALDOSTA — An exhibition of rare 18th and 19th century Mexican religious folk paintings is on display at Valdosta State University's Fine Arts Gallery on the first floor in the Fine Arts Building on VSU's Main

Titled "Miracles of Mexican Folk Art: Retablos and Ex-votos," the dis-play is a unique and vivid celebration of Mexico's vibrant artistic and religious heritage, said Stephen Andersen, gallery director.

"This special exhibit features 36 religious votive paintings made during the Mexican post-colonial period between 1780 and 1910," said Andersen. "Each painting expressively yet naively depicts Christian religious personages that were held in strict devotion.

"Retablos are oil paintings, usually on tin, of a Christian saint or saints. They were painted by untrained artists from the provinces of Mexico. Although retablos are captivating and

Andersen said devout Mexicans placed them on their home altars, where they were appealed to for good health, prosperity, good relationships, protection from all evils and for eternal salvation. The use and worship of retablos, he said, was a very central part of the lives of the Mexican people, and their power and circulated by Exhibit Touring Services, a program of the College of Fine Arts at Eastern Washington University. 



Artist from Valdosta teaching art to children with disabilities

VALDOSTA - Local artist and teacher R.K. Young has been hired to work with a group of children in Tifton in a combination dance/visual production workshop designed for children with disabilities.

The program, which runs for one week only, begins Monday and ends Friday. It will be from 10 a.m. to 3 a.m. at The Carolyn Ellis School of Dance. Presented by Community Connections Inc., it is called, "Making

Community Connections is a non-profit organization that serves to enable and empower Tift County's families who have children with disabilities by extending opportunities and resources for full inclusion into

The program is designed to work with a micro-community of children in developing movement and rhythm in both dance and the visual arts. The mission of the program is to help children with disabilities partnered together with "typical" children discover the dancer and the artist within themselves. The week of activities will culminate in a performance Friday.

Miss Young, 30, is a native of San Diego, Calif. Her family moved around the country several times during the first years of her life, settling in Valdosta when she was 10. A graduate of Lowndes High School in 1981, she attended Congress College in Spartanburg, S.C., on scholarship, where she graduated with a bachelor's de-

She said she tried various careers after college, even-tually becoming a computer programmer. This field was exactly her cup of tea, though,

"After an extent at that, I decided I needed to work never been that attached to my work. with people more, rather than be holed up in a cubbyhole with a computer," she said in an interview at her Valdosta office/studio Wednesday. "I listened to my parents' advice, came back home and got my certification to teach from Valdosta State College in 1989. Then weren't happy!"

"I still teach there - grades fifth through seventh. It was also in 1989 that my friend, Ouida Lampert, and I started the Southern Artists' League. We felt it was important to have some sort of organization for artists to get together, share ideas and have exhibitions so the community knows we're here. Then in 1990, we formed our partnership and started working together.'

Today, that partnership is known as Lampert & Young Inc. The two women call their office on Slater Street, "Artistic License," so the public will not think

Ms. Lampert and Miss Young are professional artists who do collaborative works of art on commission, and they also sell art work out of their office. Miss Young community life. Miss Young and Carolyn Ellis, a dance teacher/therapist, will be teaching the program.

"I do the drawing of the art work mostly, and I also do the bulk of the designing when the work is on silk," she said.
