VALDOSTA What fools these mortals be," Puck notes of young lovers and the world in general in William Shakespeare's fantasy, "A Midsummer Night's Dream."

Luckily, Lowndes/Valdosta Arts Commission gives local schools the opportunity to prove Puck wrong.

Early next month, LVAC hosts two abridged performances of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" for area school students. The shows are presented by Georgia Mountain Theater, a professional touring company which has participated in LVAC's young theater program for several years, and the shows are offered to regional school classrooms at discounted ticket prices. Making "A Midsummer Night's Dream" a wise choice, indeed.

These performances provide something more than just a field trip away from the classroom for students. Seeing Shakespeare, nay, hearing Shakespeare, performed correctly by professional actors for even an hour can make more sense of the Bard and his words than two weeks worth of reading his lines in a classroom.

Shakespeare wrote plays to be performed. Analyzing his works, line by line, came many years later. There is nothing wrong with studying his works, though. Shakespeare penned some of the best lines in the history of the human language as well as some of the most used and familiar phrases in the English lexicon as well. But hearing these lines performed brings increased understanding to reading Shakespeare's words.

Especially, with the magic, romance and humor of the beloved "A Midsummer Night's Dream."

This is a tale of mischief and misunderstandings, magic and mirth. Theseus, duke of Athens, and Hippolyta, the Amazon queen, are to be married, while a quartet of confused loyers roam the forests in a mistakenly charmed daze. Throughout the play, sprites and fairies as well as rustic rubes cavort through the enchanted woods. Overseeing all of this cavort-

Capturing the Moment Exhibit captures artist's best

VALDOSTA luster Richardson captures so many moods, expressions, scenes and tones with his watercolors on exhibit at the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts, it is almost impossible deciding where to start. There are the young faces filled with a child's wonder, defiance, uncertainty, skepticism and sheer wonder. There are the slightly perturbed waters in the serene but no less powerful figures of "Crabbing." There are the juxtapositions of white shirts and brown faces, white railing and somber shadows in "After the Wedding." There is the impossibly caught splash of water within the hues of watercolors of the young swimmer in "Wave." There are the wrinkled hands, skins and faces of older subjects, whose eyes retain the energy of Richardson's children, whose eyes are given to a certain wisdom often shared by the very young and the very old. Each wall, each painting, of this exhibit contains a new excitement in both image and the quality of Richardson's skills. He is a master of watercolors with a masterful eye for detail, subject and composition.

A Tallahassee, Fla.-based artist, Richardson has a way of capturing his subjects that is uplifting, thought provoking, and most of all vitally inspiring.

"My work primarily encompasses people and their expressions so I may reflect their emotion through my painting," Richardson notes in an artistic expression. "... While I may not always reproduce an image, an exact likeness of someone, I paint what I see, what I feel, believe that person feels, their adornment around their eyes, who they are."

he artistic energy of one man dominated and electrified the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts during a recent exhibit opening. That man is none other than Valdosta State University President, Dr. Ronald Zaccari. Zaccari's exhibit, sponsored by Advanced Hearing Care in the Turner Center's Price-Campbell Foundation Gallery, features an amazing abundance of art – more than 60 pieces that have been in production for eighteen months.

Utilizing diverse materials and artistic processes, Zaccari includes casting, cut-paper, computer imaging, drawing and carving to create an exhibit that appeals to many audiences.

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

Something About Marys

Three Marys open an expressive exhibit at arts center

fficially, the name of this exhibit is "Oodles of Options," but it is really too tempting to keep from calling it the Three Marys, scheduled to open Monday as one of four new shows at the Annette Howell Turner Center for the Arts. The "Oodles" show features regional artists Mary Brauk-

man, Mary Elizabeth Fisher and Mary Ann Staples. All three are painters and all three possess intriguing insights of vision for their subjects. Judging from advanced slides of their work, each Mary has a palpable grasp of color and its uses

Yet, it is the use of these colors and the shaping of each composition which sets each Mary apart. Staples' canvasses are peopled with interesting characters,

subtly moody cartoon shapes in some cases, but the colors invest these characters with a verve of fun and thought. Staples works primarily in watercolors, showing a mastery of the form. She enjoys the "transparent versus opaque medium." She com-bines her knowledge of printmaking to create textures to her watercolor and pencil works. Her works seem perfect for children to view and Staples has taught children art for many years. "I enjoy watercolor as a creative and exciting medium that children can use without damage to themselves or the environment," Staples says in an artistic statement. Braukman combines watercolor with elements of collage to create abstract expressions of color and composition. Textured works built from many levels to create varied levels of insight. One of her advanced slides includes a piece, "Friends in Coats of Many Colors," that resembles the intriguing swirls and vivid colors of something akin to a Peter Max psychedelic painting of the '60s. Yet, more fascinating is that each of Braukman's pieces, again from the advanced slides, seems to incorporate a different style and technique. "As a painter, my primary goal is to create a natural feeling of motion, dimension, and texture," Braukman says in an artistic statement. "I want to encourage the viewer ... to feel adventure in my work. Many of my ideas come from my travels as I see clouds, water, land formations and abstract forms.' Fisher's watercolors and compositions appear to almost swirl in a dance of rhythms, whether the subject matter is a series of lamps or a more abstract piece. Other pieces, such as "Sisters," are blocked and effective in capturing a somber moodiness, again, judging from previews of her advanced slides. "When I first started painting, color was an important ingredient in motivating me toward watercolors," Fisher says in an artistic statement. "Drawing and painting in an abstract or semi-realistic style, I like to complete some designs and partially complete others in my work, thereby enticing the viewer to mentally complete them and become co-creator with me. It's more challenging to me to transcend the subject matter than to report it.'
