



Downtown park hosts event Thursday evening

n unusual event is scheduled for this week, which invites the public to participate in an evening of music, food, socializing and drawing on a blank canvas to commemorate the life of a buoyant Downtown Valdosta personality.


Sponsored by the Valdosta Main Street Program, "Spring-time in Mack's Park" is scheduled for Thursday evening at the downtown park. The event, like the park, is dedicated to Mack Freeman, who as a floral designer was a part of Downtown Valdosta's business community for more than 20 years. Freeman died in March 2000.

Last year, a park was dedicated to Freeman. Located at the end of Bennie's Alley adjacent to Mckey Street, the park is dominated by a metal sculpture of flowers created by Valdosta artist Wilby Coleman. Unveiled during last May's event, the sculpture is entitled
"Unarranged Flowers: Where
Is Mack Now That We Need

The timing of "Springtime in Mack's Park" is scheduled to commemorate Freeman's birthday. Prior to Thursday's events, a large blank canvas and easel will be placed in the park Artist Dick Bjornseth, a Southern Artists' League member and a member of Valdosta State University's art faculty, is scheduled to start the canvas with an underpainting outlin-ing Coleman's "Unarranged Flowers", sculpture. Once to paint their own flowers, write comments, signatures, etc., on the canvas.

"It is hoped this community painting event will become an annual affair," according to Main Street. "Over time, the canvases from the preceding years will be displayed at future events. A temporary outdoor gallery to Mack Freeman will grow from this event, commemorating not simply the commitment of Mack to beauty and flowers, but to the artistic talent of all Valdosta."


