From "The Name Game," close harmonies and teen love ballads of the early '60's to the driving anthems of liberation in the late '60's, the songs of *Beehive* and the women who sang them continue to spark the radio airwaves some 30 years later. They may be the "birthright" of one generation, but their appeal is not lost on subsequent ones.

The original stage production of *Beehive*, created and directed by Larry Gallagher, opened Off-Broadway at The Village Gate Cabaret Theatre in March, 1986 and played for more than 18 months. Gallagher died in 1988 at age of 41.

Subsequently produced by Rick Seeber, *Beehive* ran for 15 areaths in Denver in 1988-89, then embarked on a 20-week national tour. In 1994 seeber remounted the show for Omaha and Denver, where it was declared "Box Musical" by the Denver Critics Circle.

As a joint venture of Producers Network (Charles Eisler Maverick Productions, Inc. (Rick Seeber, Denver), *Beehive* a joyed "rafter-raising" engagements in San Jose (four weeks, sold out), Dead weeks), Fort Worth and Las Vegas (1995-96) where it first played in the maximum of the Sahara Hotel and then transferred to the Luxor Hotel.
