Jackson Family History

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THE HISTORY OF THE MACEDONIA COMMUNITY IN MORVEN, GEORGIA

The Macedonia Community was established by Negro enslaved peoples as a spiritual refuge during slavery and after Emancipation. The Founders surnames became Jackson, Golden, McCall, Ward, Gilbert, Rhym, Rogers, Ponder, Jones, Maxell, Inman, Thompson, Waters, Spencer, Robinson, Wilson, Jenkins, Holsendolph, Reynolds, Sharp(e), Grant, Yearby, Edwards, Miller, Simmons, Morrison, Green, Brown, Wade, Turner, Godfrey, Johnson, Gilbert, to name a few. Many of these early enslaved peoples would branch out throughout Brooks to establish other communities such as Dixie, Pidcock, Pavo, Barney, Sand Hill, Rock Hill, etc. The Macedonia Baptist Church became a haven for religious worship and community meetings. The original church building that was built in the woods behind and beside today's (May 6, 2019) building burned sometime in the 1930's (?).

Oral and written historical documents attest to the enslaved as supporting or at least not abandoning their homes during the Civil War. These enslaved peoples played a great part in preserving and maintaining the agricultural base of Brooks County during the Civil War. Because of the supplies generated and used during that conflict Brooks County became widely known as "The Breadbasket (Smokehouse) of the Confederacy.

The Macedonia Settlement was founded along the Coffee Road which was the main road of travel to Florida when the settlers came into the region beginning around 1818. Andrew Jackson and Romeo Wilson eventually purchased the property on this thoroughfare and established a way station and grist mill. After the Civil War and during Reconstruction, The Federal Colored Troops encamped on the Jackson Road (named 1991) to protect the freedmen. The well located at 5307 Jackson Road was widely known as "Sidney's Well" as a tribute to Sidney Wilson, a Creek/white enslaved woman who became the wife of Andrew Jackson, I. Her brother was Romeo Wilson, I. Many of their descendants own property in the Macedonia Community today, Monday, May 6, 2019.

History of The Andrew Jackson, I Family Farms

The Jackson Family Farms are intertwined with the founding and establishment of the Georgia colony in Brooks County Georgia with the entrance of Sion Hall, Hamilton W. Sharpe, the Gorntos and others in Morven, in 1825. Morven is the oldest community in the Lowndes and Brooks region. Brooks County would play a critical resource to the Confederate war era during 1862-1866. Historically, Brooks County lead the effort to supply the Confederacy thus being named, "The Breadbasket of the Confederacy." The Andrew Jackson, I Family farms have continued functioning since that time. During and after the Civil War, the land in District 12 continues to remain a source of economic sustainability.

The most prominent source of early Georgia history was Folks Huxford. (see Huxord Genealogical Society, Homerville, Georgia). For a historical context, one would do well to read Folks "History of Brooks County Georgia." Another excellent source is Mrs. Jane Twitty Shelton of Valdosta. (10-27-17/12-12-15). It was at Valdosta State University in the early 1970's while enrolled in a History class of Mrs. Shelton that my brother, Oglesby Lee Jackson, Sr. and my first cousin, Linda Faye Jackson Troutman, finally researched and documented the history of the Jackson Family in Morven. We will forever treasure their endeavors. It was through their efforts that we documented much of oral family history with documented American history. Mrs. Shelton's book, "Pines and Pioneers," published in 1976, confirms much of our history.

Orally, the Andrew Jackson, I families' history begins with the entrance of the planters Sion Hall and Hamilton W. Sharpe of 1818 and 1825 to Morven. We do not have written documents as to slave ownership. We have relied on our Griots, Oglesby Lee Jackson, Sr. and Linda Faye Jackson Troutman and our ancestors who took time to, "Tell us a story." We are forever indebted to our grandmother, the late Pollie Mae James Jackson, a devoted midwife and keeper of the family ties.

Pollie Mae James Jackson, (1881?-1969) was the daughter of Lee James (1850-?) and Rinda(Renee) Davis (1850-?). Rinda (Renee) Davis was the daughter of Ben (Isaac?) Davis (1818-?) who was said to have been enslaved by the Pliney Sheffield, I family. Pollie Mae claimed a Seminole heritage. Pollie Mae James married Andrew Jackson, II on March 14, 1907. Andrew Jackson, I (1845-1908) and his brother, Manson (1833-1838-?) were brought to Georgia around 1845 by

Pliney Sheffield. The brothers shared their journey from West Africa to Morven. Throughout his life, Andrew Jackson, I shared his memory of a young boy around seven or eight and his older brother, Manson, as they walked behind Pliney Sheffield to the Irwin Territory around 1845. Andrew Jackson, I married Sidney Wilson Jackson during the slave era. Sidney and her brother, Romeo Wilson, I were of mixed white and Creek Indian heritage. The enslaved man, Andrew Jackson, I (1845-1908) purchased 150 acres in District 12, land lot 313 and 312 in January, 1897. Andrew Jackson, II inherited a portion of this land at his father's death in 1908. Much of this land was owned by Pliney Sheffield, I and Pliney Sheffield, II. Many of the Jackson family were enslaved by the Sheffields. Other family members acknowledged enslavement on the McIntosh Plantation. During the Civil War, Andrew Jackson, I and his brother-in-law, Romeo Wilson, I emerged as plantation leaders during the conflict. Folks Huxford gave a "tribute to faithful slaves who carried on during the Civil War with their Masters without giving one sense of trouble."

The Morven community was a thorough way for traffic on the Coffee Road to and from Florida and connecting trade routes. The old homesteads of Andrew Jackson, I and Andrew Jackson, II and Romeo Wilson, I were demolished sometime in the 1980's. The Romeo Wilson country store and grist mill was the town village epicenter. Romeo Wilson, I traded in horses and was widely known for his fine horses. The grist mill was situated near the crossroads where the Coffee Road and today's Jackson Road intersects. The grist mill sat at the current homestead of Andrew (Jamaal) Jackson, V. Native Americans used this area as a part of their hunting grounds. The well situated at the current home of Simmie Jackson, Jr. at 5307 Jackson Road (Sidney's Well) was used as a watering hole for troops who encamped on the Jackson Road during the Civil War.

The land is Tifton and Dothan Soil. Tifton soil is the official state soil of Georgia. A typical Tifton soil profile consists of an 11inches (280 mm) topsoil of dark grayish brown loamy sand. ([en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Tifton \(soil\)](http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Tifton_(soil))). The Dothan series consists of very deep, well drained soils that formed in thick beds of unconsolidated, medium to fine-textured marine sediments. The texture is sand, loamy fine sand, loamy coarse sand, loamy sand, fine sandy loam, or sandy loam. Andrew Jackson, I and II were skilled farmers. In 1908-1909, with O. B. Spencer, I, they were one of

the first people to plant and grow tobacco with Archie Webb. (see Quitman Free Press Archives).

The land has provided nurture and shelter for generations. Traditionally, produce and animal products and timber have been the economic base. With the death of Andrew Jackson, II in 1945, his children inherited his estate. The parcels have changed familial hands several times; however, the family has lived and farmed this land since 1897. Charlie Milton (Bud) Jackson (1919-1982) purchased 58.8 acres March 18, 1958. August 9, 1975, he purchased an additional 21 acres from his cousins, Wilma Howell Gardner, etc. This land was a part of the Andrew Jackson, I Estate. With his death in August 1982, Alvin Wayne Jackson and Andrew Jackson, IV (AJ) continued farm operations. Willie Mae Sharp Jackson (Charlie (Bud) widow ceased animal production after his death. Andrew Jackson IV (AJ) ceased growing tobacco in the early 1990's and has since farmed cotton, wheat, and peanuts.

Through wars, famine, turmoil and peace The Jackson Family Farms continue to provide sustaining life giving sustenance. (see Appendix)

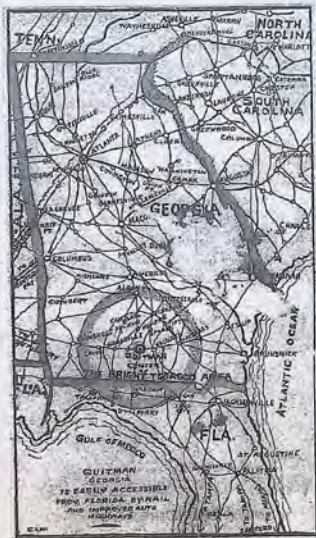

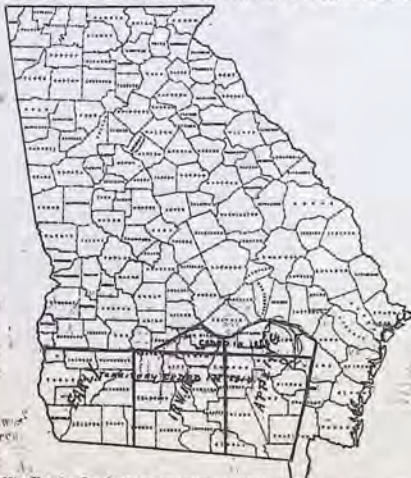
all other censuses prior to 1850, lists only the name of the head of the family.

Of the seventy-nine families listed only seven are known to have lived in Brooks, viz: Sion Hall, Elijah Beasley, James Allen, Isaac Allen, Willis King and Nathan Gornto. Dennis Allen, a brother to James and Isaac, lived where Thomasville now is, and is listed.

The great influx of settlers who came to this section is not reflected by the 1820 Census but can be seen in the 1830 Census and still later in the 1840 Census.

THE FIRST TWO ROADS

The first two roads to be opened up in the new County of Irwin were the Rountree Trail and the Coffee Road. The former extended

J. N. Simons to Andrew Jackson.

Whereas on the 15th day of January, 1897 J.N. Simons executed to Andrew Jackson his bond in the sum of \$1000.00 to convey to said Andrew Jackson one hundred acres of land in the north west corner of lot three hundred and thirteen (313) in the 12th district of Brecks County, Georgia, upon the payment of said Andrew Jackson to said Simons of three notes for the following sums and due respectfully, as follows; to wit: \$155.67 due November 1st, 1896, \$193.30 due November 1st, 1897, one for \$205.33 due November 1st, 1898, and whereas the said Andrew Jackson died without having paid the above stated sums, and whereas said sums since the death of said Jackson have been paid by his said Executrix, and whereas at the July Term of the Court of Ordinary of Brecks county, 1910, Olivia Ward formerly Olivia Jackson the qualified executrix of the last will and testament of Andrew Jackson deceased, filed her petition with said Ordinary asking him to make the said James Simons take title to the land above described, and whereas said petition was duly served and on the 2nd day of May, 1910 said Ordinary required the said J.N. Simons to make a deed to the following named heirs of said Andrew Jackson, to wit: Olivia Ward, Andrew Jackson, Jr., Sarah Robinson, Effie Johnson, Milton McCall, Cherry Miller, Hessie Jackson, Willie Jackson, Hubert McCall, Esser McCall, Charlie Miller, Fulton McCall and M.J. Jackson, said parties being all the heirs of said Andrew Jackson, deceased.

Therefore the said J.N. Simons in consideration of the payment of the above cited notes and in consideration of the order granted by said Ordinary, and in compliance with said bond for title does hereby bargain, sell and convey unto the above named parties as the heirs at law of Andrew Jackson deceased one hundred acres (100) of land in the northwest corner of lot of land three hundred and thirteen (313) in the 12th land district of Brecks county, Georgia. This conveyance is made in compliance with said bond and said order and is made subject to any disposition that may have been made of the above described land by said Andrew Jackson in his will.

Simmons, his heirs and assigns, all of one hundred acre more or less, of land, situated in the north west corner of lot of land no 313, in the 12th land district of Brooks County and State of Georgia, according to survey made by C. Henning, on the south by land of Lewis Wilson, on the west by the land of George Golding.

This indenture, made and entered into the 27th day of January in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and fifteen, between Glivia Ward, Andrew Jackson, Sarah Robinson, Effie Spencer, Cherry Miller, and Milton McCall, all of said State and County, parties of the one part, and C. B. Rogers, of said State and County, party of the other part, Witnesseth: That the party of the first part, for and in consideration of the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, in hand paid, the receipts whereof is hereby acknowledged, hath granted, sold, and conveyed unto the said C. B. Rogers, his heirs and assigns, all that tract or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the County of Brooks as follows: Part numbered one (1) of the Andrew Jackson estate as contained in lot of land three hundred thirteen (13) in the 12th land district of said County, said part being inherited by Andrew Jackson Jr. from said estate, and being bounded as follows: On the north by the lands of A. Kennedy and Jim Phillips, on the east by part numbered four in said estate inherited by Effie Spencer, on the south by part numbered two (2) of said estate and inherited by Sarah Robinson, and on the west by lands of James Colden, said tract containing twenty acres more or less; this shown by short and survey made by C. R. O'Neal, January 23rd, 1914, and recorded in the office of the Clerk of Court of said County, in deed book V, folio 798;

Also parts numbered one (1) and two (2) of that part of the Estate of Andrew Jackson, as contained in lot of land three hundred thirty-three (333) in the 12th land district of said County, said parts being inherited from said estate by Cherry Miller and Milton McCall, respectively; the same being bounded as follows: On the north by lands of Joe. DESCENDANTS OF ANDREW JACKSON, I-brought to Irwin County around 1845 from West Africa(village name Manumuso?) together with his brother Manson (Mansen) by Pliney Sheffield, I. Both brothers were youngsters around 11- 16 years old.

Andrew married a Creek Indian woman named Sidney Wilson born in 1847 GA as a slave of Pliney Sheffield, I. Sidney's brother was Romeo Wilson, I and sister, Cherry Wilson all listed as Mulattos in government records.

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Brooks County Georgia African American Genealogy

My 2nd Great Grandfather, Primus Rhym, was born in North Carolina about 1828. As a young man June 3, 1849 Primus was transported to Georgia on a Steam Ship named the William Seabrook. The captain of the ship was Peleg Blankenship. The Steamer guided by Blankenship made daily trips from Port Charleston to the Port of Savannah. This route was short and very popular because these cities were the center of slave commerce for the region.

It was common to transport fine Oils, produce, bales of cotton and Slaves as cargo. The human cargo was listed by name, sex, age, height, and complexion. The Manifesto or bill of lading detailed the Ship name, Captain's name, owner of the cargo and the final destination for the cargo. When Primas arrived in Savannah, he would have been registered with the US Custom House. The US Custom House tracked the port activity. Primus's Group was cleared by the Lazarus Brothers. The Lazarus Brothers would have also verified if the slaves were transported directly from Africa. Thomas Jefferson signed the Embargo Act of 1807 which made it unlawful to bring to the United States or its' territories any Negro, mulatto or person of color to be held as a slave or to be held in service or labor. This Act was the beginning of the turn in the tide towards ending the slave trade in the US.

In 1849 Pliny Sheffield, transported nineteen enslaved people to what would become their new home
