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



La Meri Is First Artist Series Presentation of '47

La Meri, the distinguished exponent of exotic dances of the world, whose career has carried her several times around the globe, made a personal appearance in the G. S. W. C. auditorium last night under the auspices of the Student Artist Series. She presented a program drawn from her active repertoire of over a hundred dances, offering extraordinary variety and representing many countries.

Accuracy of costume and movement is so carefully observed by La Meri and she changes mood and personality so completely from one dance to the next that she has a reputation of being 20 different persons during one pro-gram. This was well demonstrated in her performance last night. She displayed an authentic costume for every dance of every country. These costumes she brought to this country herself after years of study in Spain, South America, The Orient, India, Java, Bali and other lands. Many of them had ornate and unusual jewels, many were bespangled and bejeweled, others were made of heavy brocade and rich satin. Her collection of shoes was a study of foreign culture in itself.

La Meri made her debut as a Classical dancer in 1928, and today the whole world heralds this mimic genius. The world's famous masters have been her instructors including Tarasoff Vodonine of the Uday Shan-kar, and Jose Otero.

La Meri has danced at Max Reinhardt's Theatre in Vienna, astonished intellectuals of the Ville Lumiere at Paris and caused a sensation in the English capital. She created the role of "Cassandra" in the new tragedy of Andre Stirling at the Theatre de l'Oeuvre, Paris, and won the repeated praises of critics for her powers of mimcry after her Dance Concert at the Theatre des Champs Elysees. Berlin has hailed her, and Dance as an Art-Form."

the Scandinavian countries and all Italy recognize her as a unique figure in the dance world. She has played encore after encore for audiences in Australia, and won the hearts of the Far East when sht toured Java, India, Malaya, China, Japan, the Philippines and Hawaii. Other appearances have taken her around the world to Mexico, Peru, Chile, Argentine, Uruguay, Brazil and Venzuela and all the important European Theatres of the world.

Not only has La Meri distinguished herself as a dancer but as a musician and writer of merit Cecchetti School, Michio Ito and as well. She is an accomplished violinist and formerly played in the Symphony Orchestra in her hometown in Texas. Her name is also known in the world of letters for her poems about the life of a Texas cowboy inspired while she was studying literature at Columbia University, New York have appeared in the foremost literary magazines. Recently she has written two books on dancing-"Principles of the Dance-art," and "The

Daniza Ilitsch to Sing Title Role in 'Aida'

Viennese Star Once Doomed by Germans; Greek Basso Moscona Appears as 'Ramfis'

The title role of "Aida," Verdi opera to be presented by the Metropolitan Opera Assn., at the Fox theater April 29, will be sung by Daniza Ilitsch, beautiful Viennese who was sentenced to death by the Nazis and aved by the Russians.

The young Greek basso, Nicola Moscona, will sing the role of "Ramfis," in which he made his Metropolitan debut 10 years ago. Moscona is an established concert recitalist, and combines athletics with his music.

Blanche Thebom, a favorite of the concert stage, radio and screen, will sing the role of "Amneris." Miss Thebom, young Ohio mezzosoprano, formerly a private secretary, is the only Wagnerian star of the Metropolitan who does not have to wear a wig. She has waist-long black hair.

One of the world's leading baritones, Leonard Warren, will sing "Amonasro" in the forthcoming production of "Aida."

Others of the cast include Philip Kindsman as the king; Kurt Baum as "Radames," Lodovico Oliviero as a messenger, and Thelma Votipka as a priestess. Cesare Sodero will conduct.

The opera season will open here with "The Marriage of Figaro," at 8 p. m., April 28, followed by "Madame Butterfly" at 2 p. m., April 29. "Aida" will be the final evening performance.

The Atlanta Music Festival Assn., sponsors of this season's operas, Saturday announced opening of a box office at Muse's, beginning Monday, at which tickets to all operas will be available at a straight rate of \$5.50 for single orchestra seats and \$10 for loge seats. The box office will be open from 9:30 a. m. until 5:30 p. m. daily, and over-the-counter sale of tickets will continue until seats to all three operas are sold out.







- O STALL BE INITIATED: All pledges, whether or not ready for full mem ership, if interested in ecoming members as soon as requirements are met.
- O SHALL DO THE INITIATING: All old members of the Sports Club who are wearing their team

RULES

- 1. Initiation begins Friday, Nov. 8, with the rising bell at 7 a.m. and ends with the bells at 6 p. m.
- 3. No old member can make requests of any pledge except during the above stated time. However, old members may make appointments on Friday with a pledge to meet them on campus. These appointments may not be made before Friday. Pledges must meet old members with whom they have appointments and old members must meet these appointments.
- 3. Initiation is NOT to be carried on in classes or in the library.
- 4. Initiation is to be carried on in the dining hall to this effect CNLY: No pled e is to speak from the time she enters the dining hall until she leaves it at the end of the meal. She may not ask for things to be passed etc. -- s e must point if she wants anything. Dining hall girls are not affected by this.
- 5. AVOID ANNOYING THE PACULTY!!!
- 6. Initiation is to be carried on in the dormitories but only for the following things: making beds, sweeping, dusting, polishing shoes.
 Old members may not ask pledges to mop, wash or iron clothes, clean out closets or drawers, wash windows, change furniture, etc. Any old member who asks a pledge to "help" her in the dormitory must stay with the pledge all the time she is working in the room.
 Otherwise, the pledge will not be allowed to perform this duty.
- 7. If any pled e is required to do anything which she thinks is unreas onable, she may report it to any of the officers of the Sports Club for consideration.
- 8. All pledges are to appear at breakfast Friday dressed as follows: (Town girls at first period classes.)

 1. Low heeled shoes out with odd socks.

2. Garter - or ribbon - around leg so that it shows.

3. Display of costume jewelry.

- 4. Plaid skirt, with belt around wais, and any object dangling from it. Slacks or dungarees under skirt.
- 5. Different plaid, or striped, shirt, wrong-side-out, backwards, tail in.



Music for a Khedive

VERDI WAS ALMOST SIXTY. He had worked long and hard and successfully—twenty-four operas including the three of his middle period, *Rigoletto*, *Trovatore*, and *Traviata*, which set him beyond all question as the first Italian composer of his day. He had earned the right to retire.

But the Khedive of Egypt wanted a new work, preferably one dealing with the past glories of his land, for the new Cairo Opera House and beginning at the top he went to Verdi. The composer sought to evade the commission by naming an exorbitant fee—a method by which Grieg, in later years, tried to escape the rigors of an ocean voyage and an American concert tour. Like Grieg, Verdi was embarrassed when his offer was accepted.

Given a good idea for a lyric drama, however, Verdi was like the proverbial old firehorse when the alarm rings. Sometimes, champing at the bit and unable to wait for Ghislanzoni's text, he would dash off the music for a particular scene and ask the librettist to find words to go with the music. The correspondence was a long and trying one on both sides.

The Cairo premiere occurred Christmas Eve, 1871. Its success was tremendous and the reception everywhere else was equally enthusiastic. The first performance at La Scala, February 7, 1872, was under the direction of Verdi himself who was recalled thirty-two times. At the Metropolitan, *Aida* has been performed more often than any other work and it has served as the opera for many historic opening nights, in particular November 16, 1908, which opened the reign of Gatti-Casazza and introduced to the United States Arturo Toscanini and Emmy Destinn. Caruso was Radames.

Because the music of Aida flows continuously without the old-fashioned separation into arias, duets, choruses, and so on, the cry was raised that Verdi had been influenced by Wagner. Certainly the old man was too wise not to have profited by the advances of the German master, but the fact is that Verdi remained true to the Italian tradition. His faith in himself and Italian art was justified.
